We the second Christian late pagan party of the Onondas Nation of Indians do hereby acknowledge to have received from the People of the State of New York, by the hands of Isaac Denniston Agent for Indian Affairs, the sum of Four hundred and Fifty three dollars & thirty three cents in full of the several annuities which became due to the second Christian party, late Pagan party of the Onondas Nation on the first day of June instant, (amounting to Four hundred & thirty six dollars & ninety four cents) according to the stipulations contained in the several certain agreements made with the said second Christian party of the Onondas Nation by the Governor of the said State, the first bearing date the 21<sup>st</sup> February 1809 and the second bearing date the 27<sup>th</sup> March 1817, — and also an allowance of sixteen dollars & thirty nine cents, made by the State to the said second Christian, late Pagan Party of Onondas, for an error in the survey of land March 27<sup>th</sup> 1817

(amounting to four hundred + thirty six dollars + ninety four cents) according to the stipulations contained in the several certain agreements made with the said second Christian Party of the Oneida Nation by the governor of the said state; the first bearing date the 21st February 1809 and the second bearing date the 27th March 1817 and also an allowance of sixteen dollars + thirty nine cents, made by the state to the said second Christian, late Pagan Party of the Oneidas for an error in the survey of land March 27th 1817.

NOTES

Second Christian Party of the Oneidas.

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Dear Sir

Green Bay 26 Nov. 1828.

Since my departure from New York ill health has prevented my writing before this - Now I take the liberty to address you a line and inform you that all was done possible in my power among the Consider Sunders and others to reconcile them to the proceedings at Green Bay in 1827, by holding forth that it was hoped the Government would not finally do any thing against their Interest

New claims are however going forward this season from the Debitants for various pieces of land - many of which are of wild Lands, such as sugar Camps, and which much discourage the New York Indians - It is supposed that they are about instructing their Delegate (the Wing) to get a resolution passed to give them such claims as have been occupied since 1820 -

If any movement of this kind should take place in Congress the coming session it is hoped the friends of the New York Indians will make every effort to defeat it. Their Debitants have already had two acts passed in their favor, one of 1820 and one of 1822, under which about eighty thousand acres have been confirmed to them which have been surveyed the past summer and I think they ought to set that suffice for the present, & settle the claims of the New York Indians before any new Laws are passed -
