## Constitution of the Queida Nation of Missouri

We the people of the Queida Nation, desiring to place ourselves under a Republican form of Government, and in order to secure a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defence, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves, and our posterity, do ordain, adopt, and establish this Constitution for the Government of the Queida Nation, this 15<sup>th</sup> day of December 1879.

Article 1<sup>st</sup> The College, or Board of Counsellors, shall consist of a doctorn, and six Counsellors, to be chosen according to constitution, which follows; After due public notice has been given, a regular ballot shall be taken, and the persons receiving the largest number of votes, shall be declared Elects, to hold office for the term of one year, the Election to be held annually on the first Monday in October of each year. No person shall be eligible to hold office, who is not in full possession of all the rights of this Nation. We must have resided here in this Nation five years.

Article 2<sup>nd</sup> It shall be the duty of the doctorn to preside at all meetings, of the Board of Counsellors, and at all National Councils, and Elections, and to conduct their meetings according to Parliamentary rules, to be adopted hereafter.

Article 4<sup>th</sup> Any person to be eligible to the Office of a Counsellor must possess full National rights, must have resided in the Nation in Missouri five years

have attained the age of twenty one years, and  
be a man of good moral character.

Article 5<sup>th</sup> It shall be the duty and office of this Board of Sur-  
vellers and Auctions to conduct the business and  
affairs of the Nation, to hear complaints and  
redress grievances, to see that justice is done,  
and all laws executed that may hereafter be added.

Article 6<sup>th</sup> The Auction and Councilors and all civil officers  
shall receive from the National treasury such  
compensations as shall hereafter be determined  
by Law, but shall not receive personal fees from  
individuals for personal services rendered in their  
capacity as Councilors.

Article 7<sup>th</sup> The Auction and Councilors, or civil Officers of the  
Nation, may, and shall be removed from office  
on impeachment for and on conviction at hear-  
ings, arbitrary exercise of power not given by  
the constitution, or other illegal acts.

Article 8<sup>th</sup> Any male person is eligible to and holds the  
possession of full rights in the Nation, and is hereby  
one year of age, or upwards.

Article 9<sup>th</sup> This Constitution may be amended by a vote of  
a two thirds majority for three consecutive elec-  
tions, or by a vote of three quarters of the  
people's votes of such intention to amend being  
given for thirty days previous to any annual Election.

Article 10<sup>th</sup> Before entering upon their Office, the Auction and  
Councilors shall take upon themselves the Oath of  
Office, that they will conscientiously and faithfully  
fulfill the obligations said upon them by  
the several laws, and that they will be administered  
by the said laws, and by the Oath.

Article 11<sup>th</sup>

A committee of five men shall be appointed by the Assembly to select from the Statute of Wisconsin such laws as shall be necessary for the good of the Nation, and to form such other laws as may be necessary, and such decisions authorized to the people, for their adoption by a majority vote, shall become the laws of this Nation, if adopted.

Article 12<sup>th</sup>

It shall be the duty of the Assembly and Councilors to make the necessary provisions for the adoption of a code of laws for our Government, and also to provide for the Election of proper officers to execute the same, and also to provide for special Elections for filling vacancies caused by death or otherwise.

Article 3<sup>rd</sup>

Who must have resided here in this Nation five years. It shall be the duty of the Assembly to provide at all meetings, of the Board of Commerce, and at all National Councils, and Elections, and to conduct their meetings according to Parliamentary rules, to be adopted hereafter.

Article 4<sup>th</sup>

Any person to be eligible to the Office of a Senator must possess full National rights, must have resided in the Nation in Wisconsin five years
