

LOOKED OVER THE FIELD FOR BASEBALL

CONNIE MACK PAID A VISIT TO GREEN BAY.

Cushman is Claiming Players for the
Green Bay Baseball Team - Will
arrive the latter part of the
week.

Connie Mack, manager of the Milwaukee baseball team, accompanied by T. Engel, a director of Milwaukee club, arrived in Green Bay Saturday afternoon and were registered at the Beaton until this morning when they returned to Milwaukee. Yesterday they drove out to Oneda reservation, where they spent the day. Mack declined to give any definite information relative to the purpose of his visit to this city and eluded interviewers by telling several evasive and conflicting stories. To avoid recognition he had registered under the name of Charles Miller. It is supposed that his visit to Oneda was for the purpose of putting on his claim against Amos Reed and Chauncey Baird, the two Oneda "phenoms."

Claiming Players.

A dispatch to The Gazette from Thos. B. Andrews, secretary of the Fox River Valley Baseball league, states that Charles Cushman is claiming players for the prospective Green Bay team and says Cushman will come to this city the latter part of the week to confer with business men relative to baseball. Mr. Andrews states that with the low salary limit and all the managers living up to it "Cush" feels confident of success if he undertakes to handle the proposed Green Bay team.

Some of the Players.

Among the players Cushman has claimed are Ed. Carney of Milwaukee, who played with the Mobile team in the Southern league when that club was managed by Cushman, and Billy Hanson of Milwaukee, who played with Racine last year and with Jackson in the Michigan state league in 1898, when the club was under Cushman's management.

THE TWIN CITY TEAM CLAIMS FIRST PLACE

WANTS TO BE GREEN BAY'S REPRESENTATIVE BASEBALL TEAM.

Proposed to Strengthen the Organization by Signing of Strong Players - Record Made by Team Last Year a Very Creditable One.

The Twin City baseball team will open the local baseball season with a practice game with a "scrub" organization on Sunday afternoon, April 16. The grounds have not yet been selected. In the absence of a so-called representative club composed of professionals or local amateurs who are veterans enough at the game to be called old timers the Twin City club will aspire to first place among local ball clubs. Should another team be organized later and assert its right to leading place it will have to prove the assertion by defeating the Twin Cities.

The Twin City club is in its second season and is composed of promising young players, ranging in ages from 17 to 24. Its first season was a splendid record of victories at home and abroad.

In several games with last year's professional team the Twin Cities made a surprising showing of strength, closely pressing the "pros" for first place. In order to come up to the standard required of the city's representative team by baseball patrons the Twin Cities will be strengthened by the addition of several star players.

Indian Players.

Amos Reed and Chauncey Baird, two clever Onedans, will probably be included in the line-up during the coming season. Negotiations are now pending and they will very likely be signed within a short time. Reed is a pitcher and formerly played with the Hamilton college team. Baird is a second baseman and played formerly on the Carlisle Indian school team. Both are reputed to be fast players and if signed will doubtless add strength to the game in Green Bay.
