Sir:

Replying to your office letter of June 24, concerning transfer of employes whose positions will be abolished, I have the honor to state that in making up my estimate for employes for 1910, I had in mind the requirement that the per capita for employes should not exceed \$70, and therefore omitted all employes that I thought could safely be spared, and in the Remarks and recommendations on the last page I stated that the positions that could be omitted were the Physician at \$600, Teacher at \$540 and Industrial Teacher at \$720 and Asst. Seamstress at \$240. The average attendance for the year was 146, which can not be exceeded this year under the rules governing dormitory space. With this attendance the three teachers can carry on the work very well, but I can use the four, as many of the pupils are small and I can get better results by having them attend two short sessions each day, instead of full half days. Miss Hadden does not ask for transfer, and the suggestion was made on the supposition that it would be necessary to reduce the teaching force.
