

NOTICE TO THE EMPLOYEE

from the INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION OF WISCONSIN, as to
CLAIMING BENEFITS FOR 1944 UNEMPLOYMENT
under Wisconsin's Unemployment Compensation Law

1. Because the Employer named below is covered by Wisconsin's "U. C." Law:—
 - (a) If you are *out-of-work* for any week, you should register for work and claim benefits.
You may receive unemployment payments, based on your work for this Employer, provided you are eligible under the law.
 - (b) While you are working for this Employer, if your weekly wages drop because of slack work, you should claim "partial" benefits, as explained below.
2. **YOU MUST CLAIM BENEFITS PROMPTLY, WHEN YOU BECOME UNEMPLOYED.** Make your claim through your district U. S. Employment Service Office. For the address, see the poster in your work-place.
3. **IF YOU ARE going to be OUT-OF-WORK for a whole CALENDAR WEEK:—**
 - (a) Register for work promptly, within that week, at your district U. S. Employment Office; and
 - (b) Notify that office that you want to claim benefits; and
 - (c) Follow their instructions on weekly reporting of your unemployment.
4. **IF (and when) SLACK WORK has made you "PARTIALLY UNEMPLOYED" in any CALENDAR WEEK:—** fill out the bottom part of this sheet, promptly; and take it (or mail it) to the "U. C. Examiner" at your district U. S. Employment Office.

How can you tell when you may have been "partially unemployed?"

If lack of work drops your wages for any calendar week below $\frac{3}{4}$ of your average weekly wage from this Employer, then you MAY have been "partially unemployed" during that week. But no one is "partially unemployed" under the law if his wages for the week were as much as \$20 (the law's top benefit rate).

If you want to estimate your 1944 benefit rate, use the back of this sheet.

HOW YOUR 1944 WEEKLY BENEFIT RATE WILL BE DETERMINED

When you file your first 1944 claim for benefits through the Employment Office, your Employer will be asked to make out a "Benefit Liability Report" for you, and to send you a copy.

That Benefit Liability Report will show how much wages you earned from this Employer, and in how many weeks you worked for him. From those figures the Industrial Commission will determine your 1944 Benefit Rate from this Employer,—and will notify you accordingly.

In the meantime, you can figure for yourself about what your 1944 Benefit Rate from this Employer, will be, as follows:—

(1) In HOW MANY WEEKS did you do ANY WORK for this Employer IN 1943?

If your Answer to (1) is 5 weeks or more—FILL IN THIS SIDE OR, If your Answer to (1) is none, or less than 5,—USE THIS SIDE

(2) What were your total wages, from this Employer, earned during 1943? \$.....
(3) Divide those wages by your 1943 work-weeks, to get your 1943 "Average Weekly Wage" \$.....

(2) How many weeks have there been in 1943 and 1944, up to now, in which you did some work for this Employer?
(Add 1943 and 1944 weeks together)
(3) What were your total wages, from this Employer, during 1943, and during 1944, up to now? \$.....
(Add 1943 and 1944 wages together)
(4) Divide those 1943-1944 wages by those 1943-1944 weeks, to get your 1943-1944 "Average Weekly Wage" \$.....

From your above "average weekly wage", you can tell your 1944 Benefit Rate, by the following "Table."
