The monthly registers for the first half of the year, which were such to your predecessor and those which will be sent to you will show that the number in attendance has been about the same as heretofore. They will show too that there is much more regularity during the winter than summer. The reason of this is that all that are older is kept at home to assist in berries, picking ---. The course of studies, consequence of most of the children not understanding English, is as yet confined to the Elementary branches. As they learn English, which they are gradually doing, these may be inlayed and the school because of increased benefit. Under the circumstances, I feel satisfied with the progress made.
