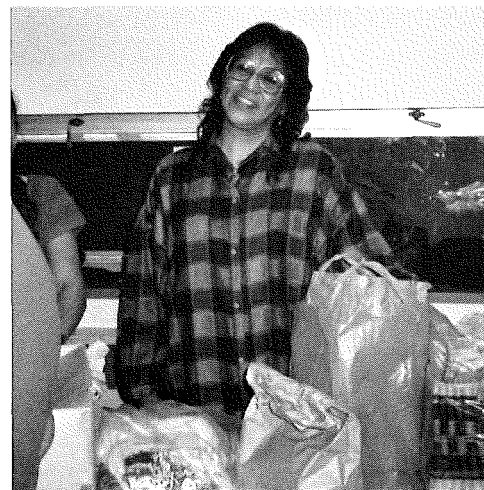
Last but not least: Volunteers.

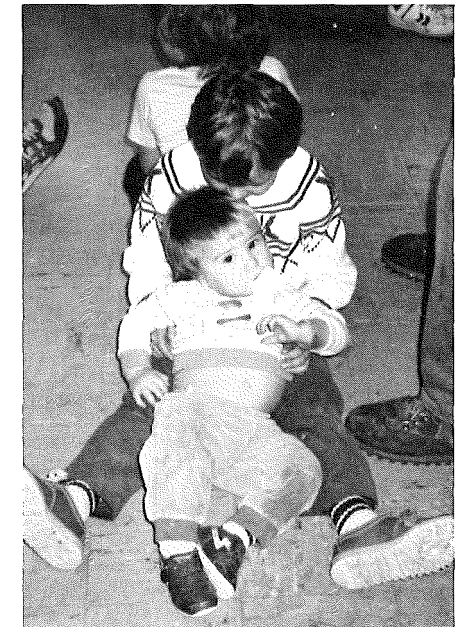

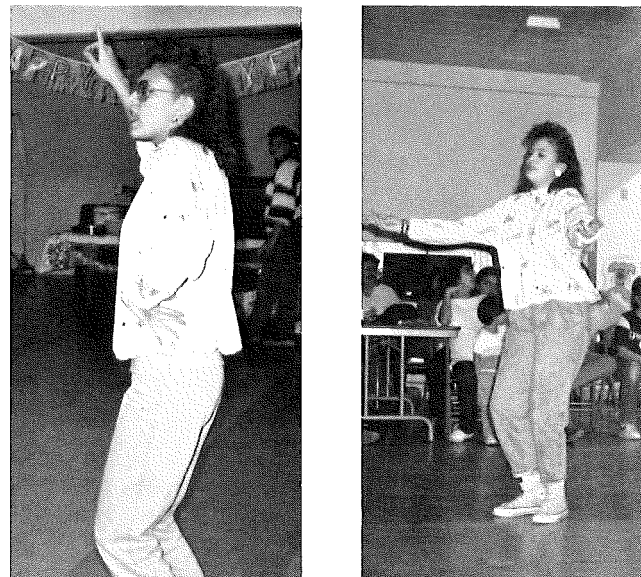

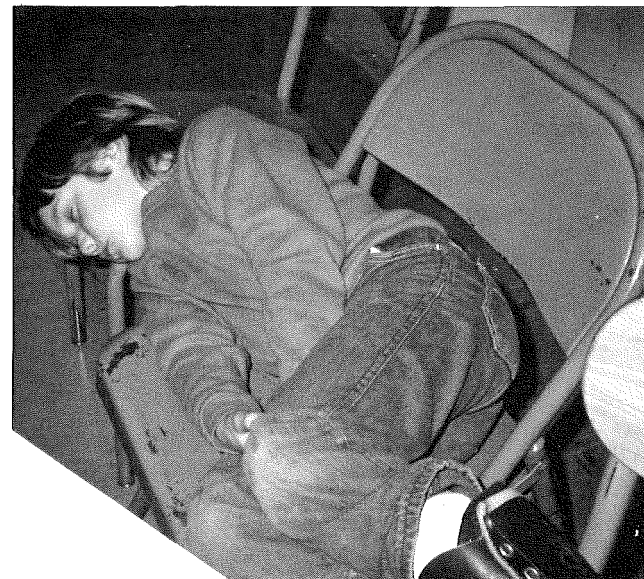

A LETTER TO THE BUSINESS COMMITTEE

Dear Members of the Business Committee;

As a concerned person for the welfare of our people, I feel that something should be both said and done about the policies of the Oneida Tribe concerning the Tribal Christmas parties. I feel that an event such as this can be held without any alcohol involved.

We, the Oneidas, have several programs which are trying to help people stay away from alcohol and drugs. Yet, alcohol is put right in front of the people during these tribally sponsored parties.

I feel our Tribal leaders should take a very close look at this practice. Not all of our people understand the effects that alcohol and drugs have upon us -- as individuals, as a community and as a nation.

As a recovering person, I can relate all the problems that I've experienced in the past to alcohol; whether it be financial, physical, spiritual, emotional, mental or social. Some of us in the Oneida community are struggling in an attempt to get our families, friends and community members to see all the negative effects of alcohol and drugs. And to let them know that one has to go through the terrible consequences of alcohol and drug use and abuse. They do have other choices.

Some of our people are trying hard to rid their lives of drugs and alcohol. But when a festive occasion is held in the community, such as the Christmas party, and alcohol is served, they may feel that it's O.K. to drink "just this once" and because of their addictive personalities, they may end up drinking for several days as a result. They may also possibly use money saved for food or other badly needed household items. This could cause them a great deal of guilt, shame, anger and pain. Family arguments and other disruptive behaviors could occur.

I know we all have choices, but I do wish that some thought would be given to the idea of having these kind of functions without serving alcohol at them. Making it convenient and socially acceptable not only hurts our people as individuals, but it is completely contrary to what some of us in the community are directly trying to combat: alcoholism, drug addiction, family problems, etc. It also goes against the programs that are trying to help people deal with these problems.

Finally, I wish to thank all of those persons who have helped me to stay sober. Thanks for all your prayers and thoughts and deeds.

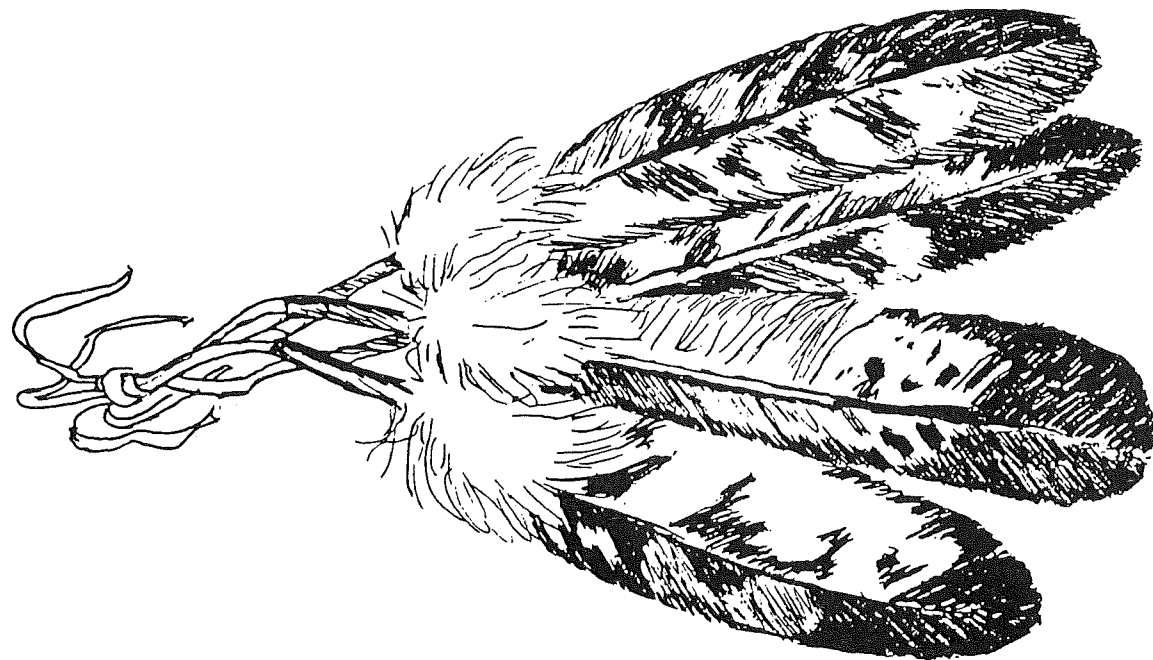

MOBILE HOME LOANS AVAILABLE

Applicants must meet certain underwriting criteria such as income and credit standards. The mobile home must also be on a "permanent" foundation. This does not mean that a basement is required, but it does mean that concrete piers (sona tubes), a concrete block frame, or a similar anchoring device must be attached to the mobile home. Sona tubes will be permitted in the Green Earth Court, currently under construction by the Oneida Tribe on Outagamie County Trunk "H".

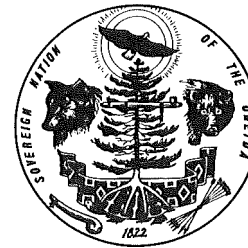

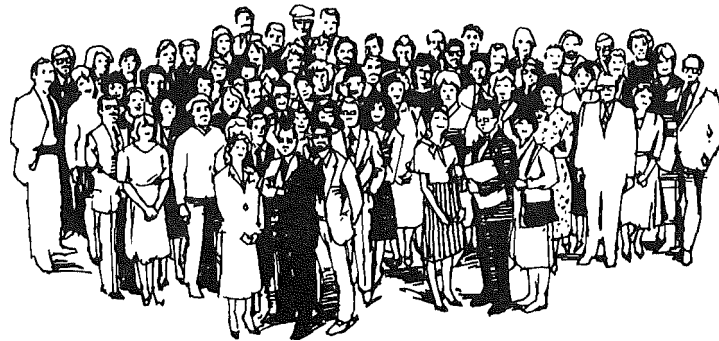

There is a major change in this year's Weatherization Program; **we will be able to serve mobile homes.**

Who is Eligible?

- Household who has not received weatherization service since September 1979.
- Household has a family member who has received AFDC/RNIP during one or more of the 12 months prior to application; or
- Household has family member who has received SSI for one or more of the 12 months prior to application; or
- Household's annual income does not exceed 125% of federal poverty guidelines.
