

## KALIHWI — SAKS

The logo of the Kalihwi-saks, the official publication of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, encompasses much tribal symbolism. Building upon the heritage of the publication and the heritage of the Oneida people, this fairly recent adaptation of the logo by Oneida artist, Mary LeMieux, integrates traditional thought and contemporary artistic form.

The first written publication which specifically addressed tribally-relevant issues was known as "The Scout." Although only a local newsletter, it sufficed as a means of informing the reservation community of local events and concerns. Very quickly, however, it altered in format and content and grew to become a viable publication with a readership of approximately 8,000.

Because our people are matrilineal, it is not uncommon for our women to hold many responsible positions within the tribe. For much of this paper's history the position of editor has been held by a woman. Therefore, as the paper evolved and the banner reflected the word for "scout" in the Oneida language, it was logical that the name would be made feminine, viz., "Kalihwi-saks," figuratively translated as "She looks for news."

The border which circumscribes the logo reminds us that all things in life are cyclical. Just within the border are overlapping semi-circles or domes. These domes represent Mother Earth, and particularly, "Great Turtle Island," the traditional reference to the North American continent. The symbols ( ) represent the Great Tree of Peace, which in turn signifies the forming of the Iroquois Confederacy of which the Oneida nation is a part.

Within the circle one sees a proud Oneida woman with braided hair. Her braids signify that her mind is clear and that she is in balance with Creation. Her view is unclouded and unobstructed. It continues over the grasses and the medicines and the trees. It reaches to our eldest brother, the Sun. A scout must have this quality of clear vision, and must be able to return to the people with accurate information of what has been seen and what is now known. This is the responsibility of the publication, Kalihwi-saks. This is its logo.



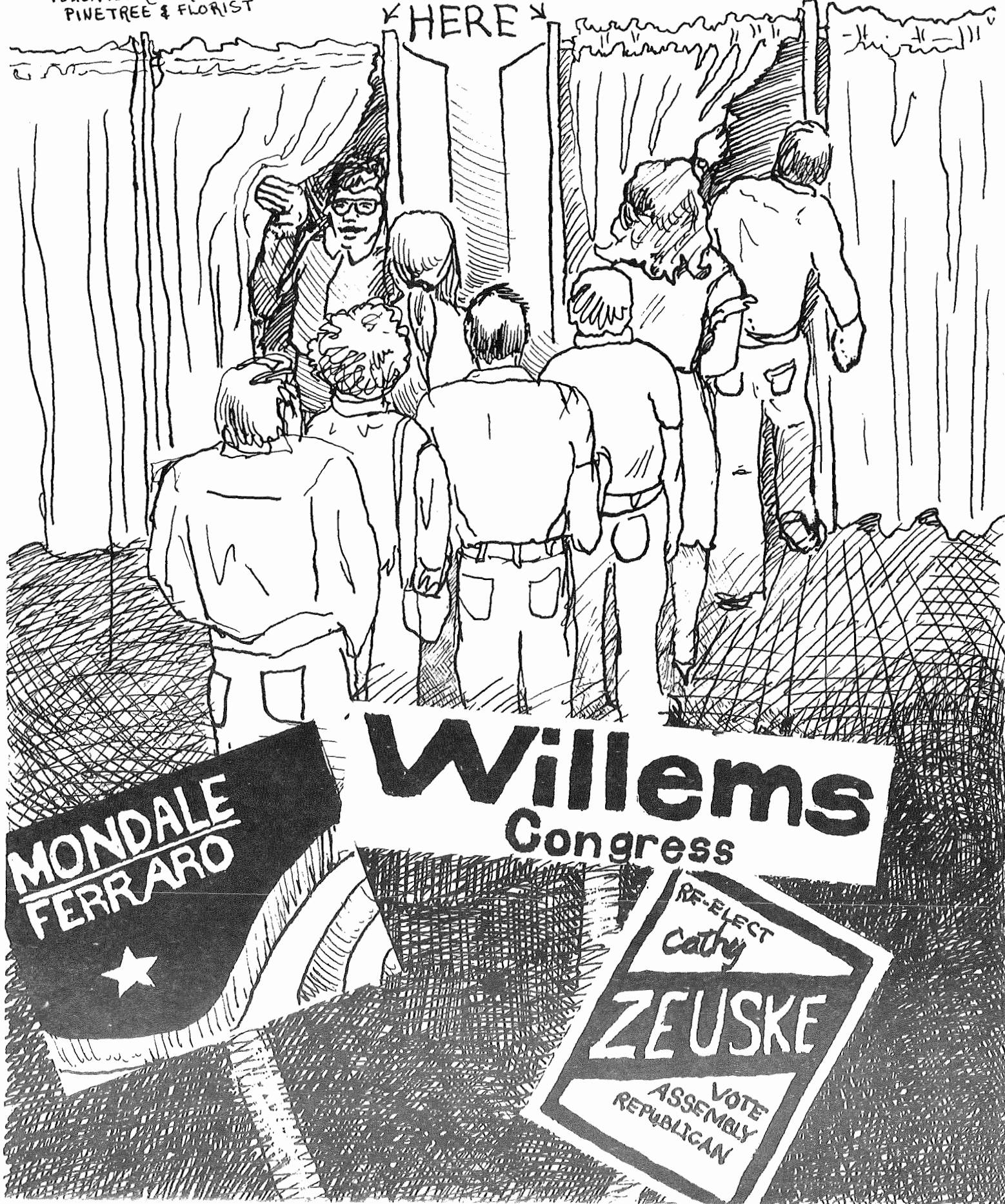

I recently retired from the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs as Chief of the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education in the Central Office, Washington, D.C. I am an enrolled member of the Creek Tribe of Oklahoma. I am contacting you as a private citizen to encourage you to vote for Walter Mondale as our next President.

After spending the last four years working within two blocks of the White House and with Reagan's puppets in the BIA, I am totally convinced that Reagan's administration is committed to termination of Indian Tribes and getting out of the Indian business and turning Indian issues over to the States. This Republican administration needs only four more years to complete this job!

There is increasing momentum among Reagan's advisors to terminate the government to government relationship that has existed between the Federal government and sovereign Indian tribes for more than 100 years. If we vote this administration back into office they will have enough time to complete this termination. Their method will be the promise of grants administered by the States.

I have observed a BIA over the past four years that is totally insensitive to Indian problems throughout the nation. Their only concern is how to: cut the budget; close schools; cut Indian health budgets; reduce funding to Indian welfare programs; reduce funding for Indian water projects and economic development. If there is any Indian program that is better off today than four years ago, I don't know about it!

Walter Mondale has always worked to support Indian self-determination, Indian education, and Indian economic development. Some of you surely know that Minnesota has one of the best Indian scholarship programs in the nation. We, as Indian people, can depend on Walter Mondale to be sensitive to our needs and support our efforts toward self-determination.

I have not been asked by the Democratic Party to write this letter (since I have always voted Republican before). I am personally paying for all cost of materials, printing and postage. I am contacting you because I care what happens to my children and grandchildren, and I care about your children and grandchildren. I hope you care enough to vote for Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro. If you don't, Indians of today, and the younger generations are going to suffer irreparable harm under another four (4) years of Reagan policies.

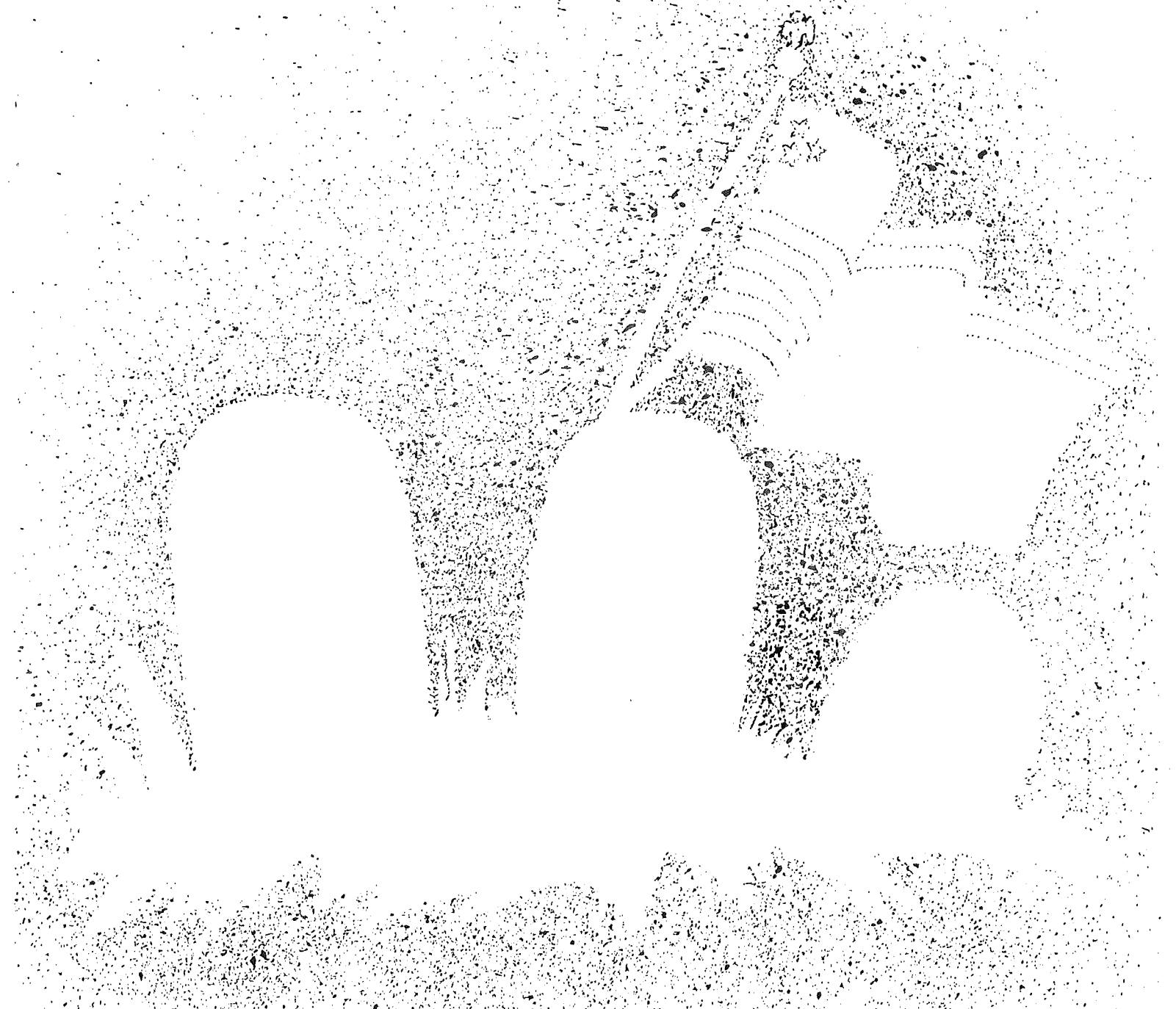

## FACT SHEET ON NATIVE AMERICAN POLICY

### Introduction:

American Indian and Alaska Native governments stand in a legally and historically unique relationship with the United States. Their sovereign powers of self-government predate the Constitution, and have been recognized repeatedly in both American and international law. Under the Constitution and countless treaties as interpreted by numerous court decisions, the Federal Government owes a special fiduciary duty to Indian and Alaska Native governments. This trust responsibility is not a mere gratuity, but instead represents a compelling legal and binding obligation which arises from solemn treaties -- pursuant to which Indian nations exchanged most of their once vast domains for the promise of the United States to protect, nurture, educate, house and provide medical care to Indian people.

Although Indians unflinchingly have honored their part of the bargain, the United States repeatedly has breached its promises. The voices of Indian people rarely have been heard, and short-sighted, frequently cynical policies often have held sway which proceeded from the premise that Indian tribes as discrete political and cultural entities ultimately must pass from history. Bureaucratic inertia has stifled even those enlightened policies which held greater promise for bettering the livelihood of Indians and protecting their unique status. As a nation, America has failed with disturbing regularity to appreciate the rich and diverse Indian cultures. The tragic result is that Indians rank at the bottom of virtually every known measure of socio-economic well-being.

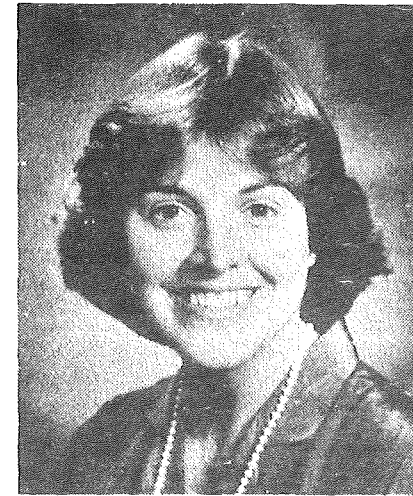
### The Mondale Perspective:

In the Mondale-Ferraro Administration policy initiatives will proceed from two fundamental premises. First, Indian governments will be regarded as permanent institutions in the American political system. The utter and complete failure of the termination policy represents a tragic chapter in Indian history which must never be repeated. Tribal political and cultural permanency is the Indians' historical and legal birth-right, and that right will be honored without exception.

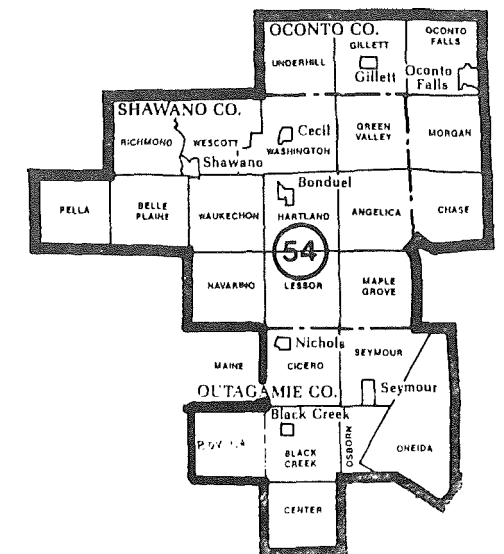

Second, implicit in the special relationship between the Federal Government and Indian tribes is a duty to assist actively in the restoration of Indian tribes and their members to the economic self-sufficiency and the political and cultural self-determination which they once enjoyed. At the time treaties were made, tribal leaders negotiated for the explicit and specific purpose of preserving these attributes of Indian societies. America's failure to honor the promises made in those treaties has devastated reservation economies, severely weakened tribal political institutions, and resulted in the decimation of Indian cultures. The Mondale-Ferraro Administration will establish and pursue policies intended to repair the great damage inflicted by America's failure to keep its word.

History reveals the basis for sound policy. In consultation with Indian people, the Mondale Administration will establish and promote programs designed to achieve the following goals:

- (1) the vigorous and effective protection of tribal resources from confiscation, waste, or unwanted exploitation;
- (2) the reduction of bureaucratic interference with tribal internal affairs and initiatives; and
- (3) an enhancement of the standard of living for Indians until they have achieved parity with society at large.

At the core of these goals is the protection and strengthening of tribal governments. The only viable vehicle for assistance to Indians is the tribal structure, and the resources and influence of the Federal Government will be used to strengthen the capacities of Indian governments to serve and protect their citizens.

The unfortunate legacy of misguided past policies is that tribal governments frequently lack the financial wherewithal and the technical expertise to protect tribal resources adequately. Although legally obliged to do so, the Federal Government too often also has neglected its duty to protect tribal resources.

The Mondale-Ferraro Administration will protect vigorously the resource base of Indian tribes and, where appropriate and justified, will expand that base to meet the urgent needs of Indian people. Although the Bureau of Indian Affairs all too frequently has not performed its duties as trustee satisfactorily, it often has interfered needlessly in the affairs of tribal governments -- resulting in the stifling of tribal initiatives. The capacity of the BIA to protect precious tribal resources from wasteful and exploitive uses will be enhanced, but its intervention in matters of tribal self-government will be

discouraged. The form of tribal government and its governance of internal tribal matters are subjects which two centuries of legal authority have committed unequivocally to the discretion of tribal governments themselves.

#### Specific Proposals:

The Mondale-Ferraro Administration will address two key areas in developing programs aimed at enhancing the standard of living on Indian reservations. First, Indian health and education will be considered items of the highest priority. A healthy and educated Indian population ultimately will represent the tribes' most significant asset in developing and implementing reservation programs and initiatives to eradicate the endemic poverty which Indians suffer.

Second, if the standard of living on Indian reservations is to be raised significantly on a lasting basis, viable reservation economies must be developed. The failure of federal policy to facilitate the development of private economic activity on Indian reservations has produced economies which are dangerously dependent upon federal funds. Accordingly, the Reagan budget reductions have resulted in conditions which border on economic chaos in Indian country. The highly touted economic recovery proclaimed by the Reagan Administration has yet to show itself on Indian reservations -- largely because it is dependent upon private sector economic activity, which by every indicator does not exist on Indian reservations.

The Mondale-Ferraro Administration will address this dilemma by taking a page from the history of the American West. The economic strength of that region was facilitated in significant part by the development and application of enlightened and effective programs of federal subsidies and inducements to both the private and public sectors. Indian communities ironically received little in benefits from these programs, and lag many years behind the state and local governments which surround and surpass them in terms of community and economic development. The subsidies and inducements which worked so well to develop sound economies throughout the West can be adjusted, implemented, and accelerated in Indian communities -- the benefits from sound reservation economies would flow to non-Indians as well as to Indians. Thus, the reasons are compelling for utilizing this tested approach to remove Indians from the deadly cycle of poverty in which they have been trapped for generations.

The Mondale-Ferraro Administration will not forget the inestimable contribution which Indian people have made to this nation. That contribution instead will be repaid, and Indian people will be given the opportunity and the tools to achieve that which was solemnly promised over a century ago -- political self-determination, a healthy and educated citizenry, and viable, self-sustaining reservation economies.

YOUR VOTE - - USE IT OR LOSE IT

Strong words indeed! The UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION guarantees the right to vote to its citizens. Some FIRST AMERICANS (Native Americans/American Indians) were emancipated (free from restraint or restriction) in terms of citizenship in the late 1800's by certain individual acts of Congress affiliated with individual allotment of Indian lands and finally by the Indian Citizenship Act of 1924. Even so, only the men citizens of America could vote until the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified in 1920.

WHO CAN VOTE

YOU can VOTE for the President and Vice-President of the United States regardless of length of time you have resided in the State if you are 18 years or older. You then can also vote in a Wisconsin or local election if you have resided in Wisconsin and the election district where you propose to vote at least ten days prior to the election.

REGISTRATION TO VOTE

Voter registration in Wisconsin is by law required for every town, village or city with a population of more than 5,000 and may, by local ordinance, be adopted for municipalities (a town or district with its own local self-government) of having a population of 5,000 or less. In almost all the rural areas, including Indian reservations, registration occurs at the same time that you vote. This procedure is convenient for the voter in that you need not take any special steps to become registered prior to the election. When you are voting for the first time, you are required to show some kind of identification such as a drivers license or library card which also indicates your current address.

NOTE: Those persons residing in Green Bay or other municipalities such as Rhineland or Appleton DO need to follow the advance registration procedures of their respective areas.

8TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT

Congressional District 8 (CD-8) (map attached) has a population of 522,156 persons according to the 1980 census and the redistricting that occurred thereafter to assure an even distribution of voters in each of the 8 Wisconsin districts. Of these, 10,875 are Native Americans. There are 13 counties including Brown, Vilas, Forest, Florence, Marinette, Oconto, Shawano, Door, Kewaunee, Menominee, Langlade, Oneida and Outagamie. There are six (6) Indian Reservations. They are Lac du Flambeau, Forest County Potawatomi, Mole Lake, Menominee, Stockbridge-Munsee and Oneida. Over half of the Indian communities in Wisconsin are in the 8th Congressional District.

The following statements are some attitudes and actions of the Reagan administration regarding hunger and the environment:

HUNGER/NUTRITION LONG TERM EFFECTS - J. Larry Brown of Harvard School of Public Health told a task force of the nation's mayors:

*"Hunger is more widespread in America than any time since the Depression, and the evidence is a growing number of unhealthy babies . . .*

*". . . (studies have found) larger than anticipated numbers of small children are experiencing ill health & growth failure, along with increases in infant deaths & low birth weights, all of which are signs of undernourishment . . .*

*"Americans who have lived on the economic margins for years had the props knocked out from under them by federal budget cuts."*

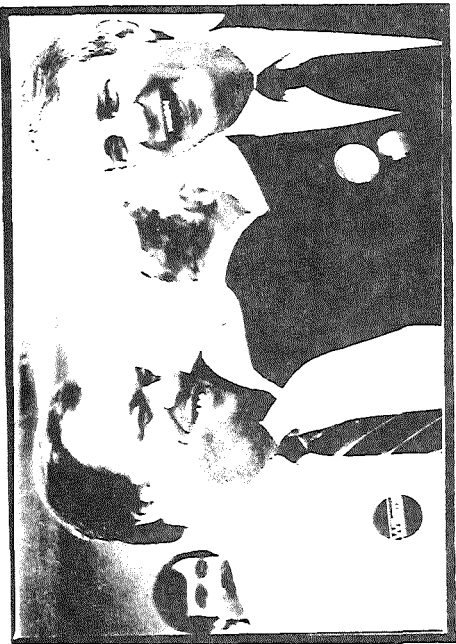
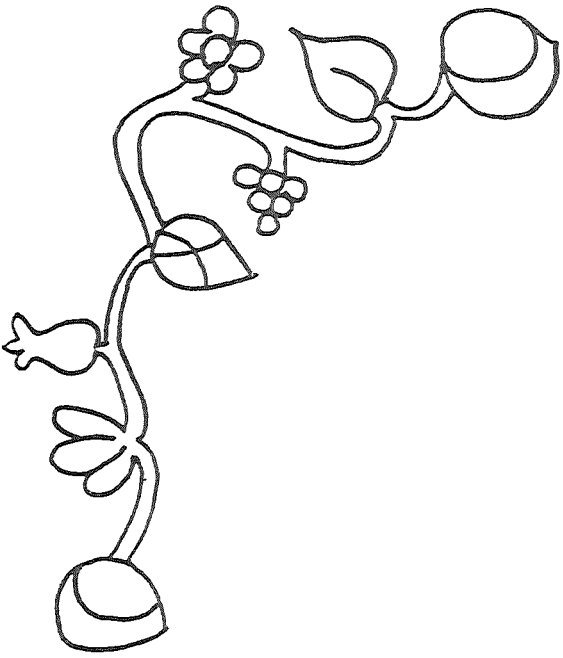

\*Paul Willems, democrat for congress, also supports the American Indian Religious Freedom Act, strong acid rain prevention and cleanup programs, and the clean air act. Willems, in addition, favors small business development on reservations and higher education grants, including a GI Bill for Vietnam veterans. While his opponent has a mixed record on such issues as radioactive waste disposal on or near reservations and the impact of mining on the environment, Willems has said disposing of nuclear waste on reservation or Indian lands continues exploitation, and supports caution in development.

The incumbent congressman has favored such administrators as Anne Gorsuch-Burford and James Watt. Paul Willems opposes erosion of environmental quality by appointment of administrators who are opposed. Favors appointment of qualified people who understand the complex relations within the environment.
