WOMEN ELECTED TO TRIBAL COUNCIL

Less than one year ago, Potawatomi women were unable to serve on their tribal council. On November 3rd, Lois Crowe of Wabeno won election as tribal chairperson of her tribe with better than a 2 to 1 victory over her opponent. In addition Arlene Alloway and Emily Jacobson also won their bid to serve as council members.

In the fall of 1974, Virginia Jacobson, member of the Forest County Potawatomi Tribe sued the federal government because the tribal by-laws did not permit women to serve on the tribal council. The court ruled that it had no precedent to interfere with tribal constitutions, especially since it was possible to change the constitution by a tribal referendum. In the spring of 1975, the tribe changed its by-laws in a special election so that women could serve on the council. As one Potawatomi woman said, "You see what can happen when you work hard and follow through on an issue".

Lois Crowe, the new tribal chairperson is also co-chairperson of Wisconsin Tribal Women, Inc.

In other recent elections at Bad River, Lac du Flambeau and Stockbridge-Munsee Tribe. Angeline Lemieux was re-elected to serve as council member for the Bad River Tribe. At Lac du Flambeau, Lucy Wolf was elected to the council and Evangeline Vallier will continue her term as council member.

Theresa Fleming of Reserve has been appointed to fill a vacancy on the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Council.

In recent elections here in Oneida Alma Webster was re-elected Treasurer, Amelia Cornelius was elected Secretary, and of the five Council Members elected three are women, Ruth Baird, Irene Moore and Joy Ninham.

UW-0 TO BRING UNIVERSITY TO NATIVE AMERICAN COMMUNITIES

The University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh will bring a series of classes to Oneida and Menominee. This program will be offered by the Department of Social Work and will have an all Native American teaching staff.

The following courses will be offered beginning February 2, 1976 through May 14, 1976. Classes will be held on Thursdays from 7:00 PM to 10:00 PM:

- 93-383 Field Work in a Minority Setting - 12 credits  
The student would perform the practicum part of the work in his/her present job.
- 93-373 Principles of Interviewing - 3 credits
- 93-375 Treatment of Offenders - 3 credits
- 93-497 Independent Study - 3 credits  
This may be a research project, a study project or a reading course.
- 93-335 Native American Personality - 2 credits

It is believed that anyone working directly with people or within a helping field could benefit from these courses.

The teaching staff for these courses will be:

1. Mr. George Swamp, MSW. George is a recent graduate from the Graduate School, School of Social Work, UW-Madison. George's tribal affiliation is Oneida. He is presently employed by the Menominee Restoration Committee.
2. Mr. Ted White, MSW. Mr. White recently retired from the Bureau of Indian Affairs where he worked for 20 years. Mr. White has had previous teaching experience at Arizona State University. He is a member of the Oneida Tribe and is presently working for that tribe.
3. Mr. Jim Durfee. Jim has taught at UW-Superior and at Utah University. He is presently employed as an Assistant Professor at UW-Oshkosh. Jim is a Wisconsin Chippewa.

UW-0 is hoping to make this type of offering more than a one-shot deal. UW-0 offers a unique change for those interested in getting a B.S. or B.A. degree through a special continuing education program called ACCESS.


In compliance with the contract to furnish tribal membership the budget amounts and purpose of the contract we are pleased to submit the following stated purpose and school district amounts:

PURPOSE - The purpose of this contract is to provide the administration of funds for assistance to eligible Indian children enrolled in early childhood through secondary education programs in eligible school district(s). This contract is governed by existing statutes in Federal Code of Regulations, Title 25, Chapter I, Sub-chapter E, Part 33: the operation criteria set forth in 62 IAM, Chapter 3; and the required educational plan.

INDIAN JURISDICTION BILL

The hearings on S. 2010, the Indian Jurisdiction Bill, were held in Washington, D.C. on December 3 and 4, 1975. By and large the Tribes were well represented and the presentation was well prepared and delivered.

S. 2010 will allow a small Tribe to participate in their own jurisdiction in part or in whole; it may be only in foster child care or perhaps in misdemeanors; the option is your choice. Be sure to write your congressional representative and Senators to support S. 2010. Request a copy of the Bill from your Senator.

S. 2010 is a bill that provides for the improvement of law enforcement and the determination of civil and criminal jurisdiction and law in Indian country, and for other purposes. S. 2010 was written by the Jurisdiction Commission of NCAI and was introduced by Senator Jackson on June 5, 1975 (by request). "By request" means that Senator Jackson will not necessarily push S. 2010. It is up to Tribes who wish to invoke self-determination to support this legislation and to get non-Indians in your respective areas to support and if possible testify at the next hearings in January.

ONAP TO SUBMIT 1976 BUDGET

TO HEW

The Office of Native American Programs (ONAP) has prepared their budget for 1976. Budget requirements for 1976 programs must be submitted to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare by January 1, 1976. If approved by that office, ONAP of Oneida will continue to provide financial and administrative management of all CAP activities. The activities required to achieve the goals of the Community Action Program will remain much the same as this past year; however, more emphasis will be placed on defining these goals more clearly.

A staff of four will be required to carry out these activities: Coordinator/Administrator, Secretary/Receptionist, Bookkeeper, and an Assistant Bookkeeper.

Training and technical assistance for the purpose of up-grading the administrative capabilities of all ONAP staff will be provided in the areas of management, planning, reporting, evaluation, as well as training and technical assistance on the Oneida Tribal Management System.

Community services to be funded under this budget request will include:

1. A program to help all people, especially the elderly and disadvantaged gain access to the human, educational and economic resources within and around the reservation. Two community workers will provide this service.

2. Recreation Program - Funds will be provided for the Athletic Recreation Director to actively seek and develop on-going and new recreation programs for the benefit of the total reservation population.

3. Provide salary for the Building Manager of the Oneida Nation Memorial Building. A long-range plan for self-sufficiency will be developed.

4. Support and assist Oneida Library. Provide salary for library aide.

5. Support and assist Tribal Industrial Development by providing space, telephone, supplies and secretarial support to the Tribal Industrial Developer.

The Oneida Tribal Council accepted the above proposal at their meeting on December 15th. It is now ready to be submitted to HEW for their approval.

MINNEAPOLIS AREA VICE PRESIDENT

STAN WEBSTER

National Congress of American Indians  
Executive Committee  
Salt Lake City, Utah  
December 11, 12, 1975

The main purpose of the meeting was to act on 119 resolutions, which were presented at the NCAI Convention held in Portland, Oregon in November.

Most of the resolutions were in support of tribal rights emphasizing the special relationship tribes have with the federal government, and their right to protect and strengthen that relationship on behalf of all tribes.

Some tribes question whether P.L. 93-638, Indian Self-Determination Act, is a move to strengthen the special relationship tribes now have with the federal government, or is this another move towards termination? Some say, that since the BIA worked on the regulations for PL 93-638 all tribes should be concerned.

The Act, PL 93-638, centers on contracting between tribes and federal government for federal Indian programs.

Stan Webster was selected to work under the Internship Program of American Indian Policy Review Commission in Washington, D.C. during the semester break (January). Again, some tribes question whether this program is a move towards termination.

Various National Indian organizations have opposed American Indian Policy Review Commission, saying this is leading to another "treaty".

## INDEPENDENT STUDY

There are many opportunities for Brown County people to become involved with Extension programming to help them in their personal life.

One of these is Independent Study - where you take non-credit classes at home and at your own pace.

Independent (Correspondence) Study is personalized instruction from University of Wisconsin-Extension. The faculty helps students to learn while studying on their own and at their own pace.

Students working toward a bachelor's degree from the University of Wis. may earn up to three-fourths the number of credits required for that degree through Independent Study. Many of the college credit courses offered may be used to earn credit toward a teacher certificate.

High school courses may be taken through Independent Study to supplement one's education, to complete a high school education, or to meet college entrance requirements.

Business, technical, professional, vocational and cultural Independent Study courses are designed to strengthen and increase knowledge in specialized areas.

Another on-going program funded through a grant, but being assisted by University Extension is an Alcoholic Training program for training Native Americans to work with their own people in counseling alcoholics. Dennis Johnson of University Extension goes weekly to Clam Lake to consult with the trainees and help them meet the needs of those they are counseling. Continuing Education Units are being given for those involved in the training program. At present, they are looking into the feasibility of students from University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh working with those involved in the program at Clam Lake.

ABOUT THE COVER ARTIST

Ernest Victor, Jr., Apache, great grandson of Apache scout named John Rope, also a graduate of the American Academy of Art, Chicago, Illinois, was born and raised on the San Carlos Apache Reservation located in West Central Arizona. This creative young man is now with Dells Park Indian Village as its artist and designer in residence.

Ernest's paintings are well known to the residents of San Carlos and they are becoming better known elsewhere in the country. During ceremonies in Memphis, Tennessee with the Dells Park Indian Village, one of Ernest's paintings was presented to the Secretary of Interior, Rogers C.B. Morton.

Another distinguished possessor of Ernest's painting ability is Mr. Theodore White, formerly with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Washington, D.C.

Always eager for another medium through which to express himself, his culture and his perceptions of the world around him, Ernest has taught himself figure carving. From driftwood and old lumber have come many beautiful crown dancer lamps and centerpieces. As is the case with his paintings, the carvings grace many homes in San Carlos and around the states.

In an effort to generate respect for an appreciation of Apache arts, Ernest has given freely of his time to local school youngsters at elementary schools talking about traditional Apache life and the changes it has undergone since the institution of the reservation.

Ernest has also demonstrated his skill with the brush in the Arizona Historical Society Museum display devoted to Harry Heffner, long-time Arizona cattleman. He assembled materials given to Arizona Historical Society by Heffner's son and produced a handsome exhibit enhanced with his painted designs. Ernest has also designed and built beautiful museum displays for the Phoenix Historical Society Museum. He designed the 1976 Bicentennial Medallion for the Arizona Historical Society. He is one of the top professional Indian artists in the southwest.

Ernest is a member of the Actors Guild in Hollywood with Paramount Studios, where he has participated in many movies.
