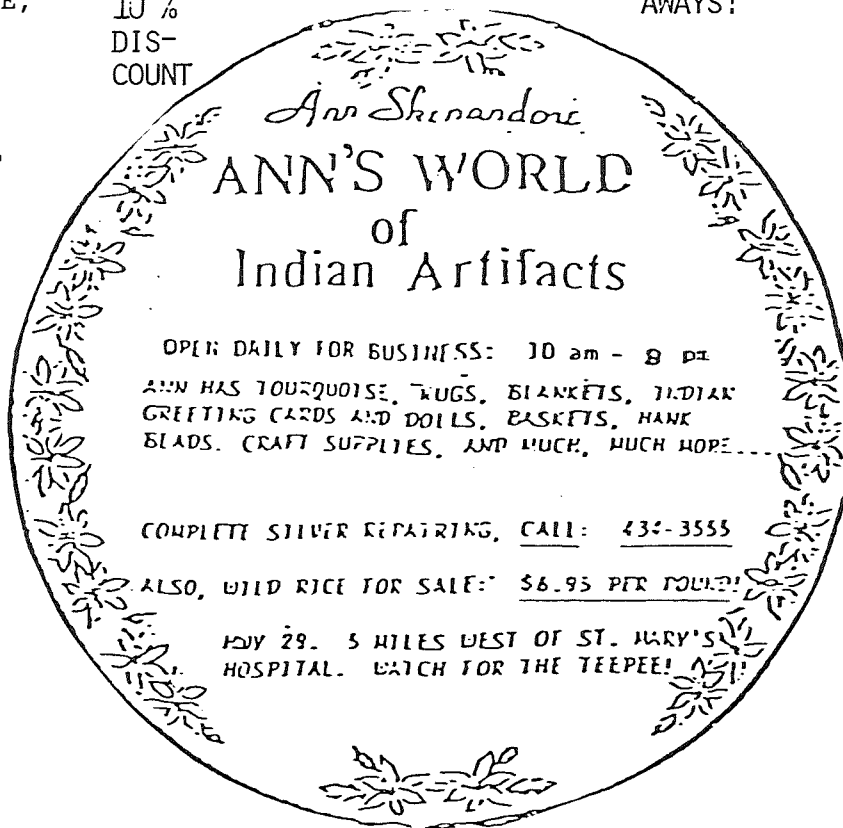

WISCONSIN OPERATING ENGINEER APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM
Affirmative Action and Minority Organizations

DO YOU WANT TO BE AN OPERATING ENGINEER?

Engineers operate and maintain almost all the engine-powered machines and equipment used in the construction industry. Being a journeyman in this dynamic craft will offer security, if you develop a good background with apprenticeship training. The operator usually is the key man in the work crew so he must be a dependable, alert, and safety conscious individual. Operating under adverse weather conditions requires a rugged person who likes to work outdoors.

This program has not been offered for the past two years due to the economic situation in the industry.

Your training will start with pre-apprenticeship school. This is designed to give the trainee related instruction and a familiarization with the type of equipment he will be operating when assigned to a contractor as a registered operating engineer apprentice. The school is staffed with journeyman instructors and there are fifty (50) pieces of construction equipment to use on the 220 acre school site.

Training is scheduled to begin in April of 1983. Applications will be accepted until the end of February. Interested applicants may obtain application blanks by contacting the Training site: Wisconsin Operating Engineers, Skill Improvement and Apprenticeship Fund, Coloma, WI or by calling 715/228-4911.

TERM OF APPRENTICESHIP AND COMPENSATION.....

- A. The term of the indenture shall be three (3) years.

Apprentice wage rates to be a percentage of the current bargaining agreement wage rate for front-end load operators under 40 h.p. The first twelve (12) months wage rate will be 65% of \$13.59 = \$8.83 per hour, plus \$2.15 for health benefit, pension and training. The wage rate will increase periodically.

QUALIFICATIONS OF APPRENTICESHIP APPLICANTS.....

- A. Must be not less than 18 years of age.
- B. Must be physically fit for work in the craft with due regard for aptitude, attitude and personal characteristics.
- C. Must have a high school education or proof of equivalence, also a transcript of grades and attendance.
- D. Must pass the general aptitude test battery for the operating engineers craft. This test is given by any branch of the Wisconsin State Job Service. This is the applicants responsibility at the time he makes application. He should instruct the branch of the State Job Service at which he takes the test to forward a copy of the results to this office. Applications will not be considered without these results.
- D. A physical examination will be required after acceptance into this program.

WISCONSIN OPERATING ENGINEER APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

SELECTION OF APPRENTICES.....

- A. All applicants shall make application for apprenticeship training on forms provided by the J.A.T.C. These forms are available only during the application period of November 1982 through February 28, 1983.
- B. There will be a minimum number of points required to qualify for the committee interview, this will be based on your application and work record. Those qualifying for the interview will be notified when and where to appear. Those not meeting the basic qualifications or minimum number of points will not be granted an interview. The Committee shall interview each applicant for apprenticeship individually and carefully with particular attention to his aptitude, attitude and suitability as a future operating engineer.

The recruitment, selection, employment, and training of apprenticeships during their apprenticeship, shall be without discrimination because of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex. The sponsor will take affirmative action to provide equal opportunity in apprenticeship and will operate the apprenticeship program as required under Title 29 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 30.

The 1982-83 Low Income Energy Assistance Program (L.I.E.A.P.) has officially opened October 1, 1982 and will run through March 31, 1983.

Eligible persons may pick up and fill out an application at the Income Maintenance office located at the Tribal Building (1288 Fish Creek Rd. DePere).

The established guidelines for both the Emergency Assistance, and regular Energy Program are as follows:

* All gross income received by the household in the calendar month prior to the month of application will be counted.

* There will be no deductions allowed (except for self employment) from gross income for employment related expenses, child care, setasides, nor for any other reasons.

* Any income that was intended for more than one month will be prorated.

* Persons living in subsidized housing or receiving housing allowance are NOT eligible for Energy Assistance.

The following are the Emergency Assistance guidelines:

1982-83 Emergency Plan for Energy Assistance

Emergency Fuel Assistance shall only be used to provide fuel assistance to households in accordance with the following guidelines.

1. Households whose gross income falls under 150% of the poverty levels.

2. The funds must be used for current needs. A fuel emergency is defined as follows:

1. A households major source of fuel is completely out or whose major fuel supply is depleted to a 48 hour (2 day) supply.

3. Payments for Emergency EAP will be made between October 1, 1982 and March 31, 1983 or until the Public Service Commission has lifted the moratorium.

4. Due to the limited amount of money given to us for Emergency Service, the payment given to a household will be in the form of a loan, whereby a household shall apply for the regular Energy Assistance Program and the amount of emergency given will be recovered from the households regular EAP check.

5. Only one emergency payment will be authorized per household per season except in cases of extreme nature or a life threatening situation.

6. The amount of the Emergency payment will be up to one half of the amount a household would normally receive for the kind of fuel that they use, or the least amount needed for the fuel vendor to deliver.

When coming into the office to apply for Energy Assistance, remember to bring the following items as the agency will need these in order to process the application.

1. Verification of income for everybody living in the household (check stubs, award letters, etc.).

2. Verification of fuel vendor (old receipts, bills, etc.).

3. Social Security numbers and birthdates for everyone in the household that is or over the age of 18.

HEALTH BOARD VACANCY

There is a vacancy on the Health Board. All enrolled Tribal Members who wish to be considered to serve on the Health Board please forward your name to the Personnel Office for Consideration. THIS POSITION IS OPEN UNTIL FILLED.

THE FOLLOWING WAS THE CONCENSUS OF THE HEALTH BOARD AND BUSINESS COMMITTEE MEMBERS PRESENT. THIS IS NOT OFFICAL ACTION AND WILL BE DISCUSSED BY ALL PERSONS AND BROUGHT TO THE BUSINESS COMMITTEE FOR APPROVAL.

ROLES AND DUTIES OF THE HEALTH BOARD

1. The Oneida Health Board shall be advisory for overall direction, leadership, and policy for the management of the Oneida Health Center, programs and facility. The Oneida Health Board will function in planning, organization, monitoring, and evaluation.
2. The Oneida Health Board shall be responsible for assuring the maintenance of Oneida Health programs and health operational standards.
3. The Board shall be responsible for overseeing the relationships of Tribal health resources to community needs.
4. The Board shall exercise direction of the Health Director to carry out policy, rules and procedures of the Oneida Health Board.
5. The Board will serve as eye and ears of the community. The Health Director will communicate with all external agencies, institutions, organizations, promotion, delivery, evaluation, training and study of health services.
6. The Board shall, if requested, assist Tribal programs involved in health needs and health related activities.
7. The Board shall advise the Health Director concerning complaints or problems relating to health, programs and staff.
8. Health Director should advose the Board of significant needs, plans, priorities objectives, progress, problems, and policies relating to the delivery of health services to the Oneida community people of the Health Center.

9. The Board shall provide to the Business

Committee documenting its plans, program, accomplishments, problems, and recommendation relating to the Oneida Health Board functions with copies to the Health Center Director and Tribal Administrator.

10. Personnel policies shall be followed as per the Oneida Tribal Management System.

11. The Health Director, with approval of the Oneida Health Board will define all job descriptions following Oneida Tribal Management System, to be approved by the Business Committee.

THE INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNT IS ONE OF THE MOST VALUABLE TAX SHELTERS AVAILABLE UNDER THE 1982 TAX LAWS, AND ANY INDIVIDUAL WILL BE ABLE TO SAVE FOR A RETIREMENT PROGRAM AND RECIEVE A TAX BREAK WHEN THEY INVEST IN AN IRA. FOR THE YEAR 1982 YOU MAXIMUM CONTRIBUTION WILL BE \$2000 FOR AN INDIVIDUAL, \$2250 IF YOU HAVE A NON WORKING SPOUSE; AND UP TO \$4000 FOR A WORKING GOUPLE. YOU DO NOT HAVE TO INVEST THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT EACH YEAR. YOU MAY CONTRIBTE UP UNTIL APRIL 15, 1983 FOR THE 82 TAX YEAR. YOU CAN INVEST IN AN IRA THROUGH YOUR BANK, CREDIT UNION, INSURANCE COMPANY, OR IN MONEY MARKET FUNDS. THESE PLANS VARY PER INSTITUTION; SOME WILL BE INVESTING YOUR MONEY IN PASSBOOK ACCOUNTS, STOCKS BONDS, CD'S, OR IN MONEY MARKET FUNDS, BY INVESTING IN AN IRA YOU WILL NOT ONLY PAY A LOWER TAX RATE BUT YOU WILL BE SAVING FOR RETIREMENT, AS BOTH THE AMOUNT INVESTED AND THE INTEREST WILL NOT BE TAXED UNTIL YOU START TO WITHDRAW FROM YOUR ACCOUNT. THERE ARE MANY LAWS GOVERNING IRA'S ONE LAW THAT YOU MUST CONSIDER IS THAT YOU MAY NOT WITHDRAW FROM AN IRA BEFORE AGE 59½ YEARS OF AGE AND YOU MUST WITHDRAW THE WHOLE AMOUNT BY THE END OF THE YEAR IN WHICH YOU TURN 70½. IF YOU SHOULD NECESSARILY WITHDRAW BEFORE THAT TIME YOU WILL NOT ONLY BE TAXED ON THE AMOUNT WITHDRAWN BUT YOU WILL PAY A PENALTY FOR EARLY WITHDRAWAL. I WOULD SUGGEST THAT IS YOU ARE INTERESTED IN INVESTING IN AN IRA YOU "SHOP" TO SEE WHICH PLAN SUITS YOUR NEEDS, WHERE YOU WILL BE RECEIVING THE HIGHEST INTEREST AND HOW THE INTEREST IS COMPOUNDED. I HAVE FOUND THAT BY SHOPPING YOU WILL GAIN A LOT OF KNOWLEDGE REGARDING THE VARYING ACCOUNTS, YOU CAN CHECK INTEREST RATES AND SOMETIMES THE INFORMATION YOU RECEIVE CAN BE A LITTLE DECEIVING UNLESS THOUROUGHLY INVETIGATED.



There are a few very basic needs that we as people are all involved in, providing for our own families. In fact, we invest a major portion of our time throughout life in supplying those basic needs. We know that we must provide food, housing and clothing. Now, at this time, we also need to consider that we must also provide land. A basic need to our future will be land. Our survival now depends on aforementioned food, housing, and clothing and the land that we hold presently. If one projects the population growth for 10 years or 20 years we see that by no means do we possess the amount of land that we will need; not want, but need, to support our Oneida people. It should be added that in order to facilitate this process we must have our own people seeing far enough ahead to forecast the urgency of this need now!

Let's take time to collect a few thoughts about our land. If you haven't taken a ride lately, please take one. You will discover that most of the lights that shine from peoples homes will be settlers whose last names are most assuredly not Doxtators, Danforths, or Metoxens or any other familiar names for that matter. Rather, the last names on the mailboxes will read something more with ski's or van's or Rueden's which should cause us to evaluate our surroundings. If this is our land; are we now in control of how our surrounding lands will be shaped? Do we have the necessary respect to influence large non-Indian land holders from condominiumizing their land as we become involved with Green Bay's urban sprawl. Or perhaps, a greater question to consider is will we be developing our own land in 5-10 years?

Now, not to dwell on criticism, lets go on to consider our perspective on land. How many different ways do we look at the land? Is the land our home? Do we spend the time with or on our land as our grandfathers and grandmothers did in their time? Take a walk or a ride to inspect some of the old homesteads that our people invested their lifetimes in building. Do we have that kind of space now? Families were built around their homesites and now I shudder to think that many of our children's life memories will be shaped by the space restrictions of our limited land base that we now have as our reality.

Now, for many, reality is that our land as our home is reduced to holding up a foundation of a house and a little bit of grass to at least give the family dog some respect for his service to the family. Our job restraints allow many no more than the time it takes to walk across their yard from the house to the car at 7:55 a.m. and back again at 4:45 each day. Can our land still be our home as it once was? People say we must give up some of our past in order to progress into the future. If this is so, how much? When do we put a halt to giving up? Where do we begin to look for our answers to make our land our childrens home?

In closing, let's consider the irony of our situation. Recently at a Tribal meeting someone asked "how big is our reservation". The reply was explicit, "We are holders of 65,000 original acres". Now let's question then, why are we now attempting to place 65 people on an acre of land with our latest addition of new houses. How will this affect our inner and inter-family relationships? Will this make it easier for us to consider condos in the future? How will we meet the demands of new people in the community? Hopefully, this directs us to grasp how serious the land question is presently, then it is also guaranteed to become more critical as each day passes. If this is our home then we must consider that it should remain our children's home as well. This could, with a little time and thought on our part, be the working principle to set our sights on making our land our home again.

11. Approval of O.H.B. Rolls & Duties by B.C.
12. Dr. Leone's address to the B.C.
13. Public Law -97-394
O.H.B.

Taken from the Oneida Constitution & by laws. Article I Section S. Appointive Officers the duties of all appointive boards or officers of the community shall be clearly defined by resolutions of the council at the time of their creation or appointment. Such boards and officers shall report, from time to time as required. To the council, and their activities and decisions shall be subject to review by the council upon the petition of any person aggrieved. As the resolution of 4-5-75, clearly defines Rules & Responsibilities of O.H.B. The main concern of the O.H.B. is the quality of care and services rendered to the Oneida Community.

SOFTWARE RECOMMENDATION BY DICK SHIKOSKI

Out of 17 proposals that came in on software it was narrowed down to four (4) firms and these firms have been inspected and at this point the company in

Milwaukee Computer Methods, Inc. seems to be the one we may be able to work with. They had something in each area we looked at whereas none of the other software systems had at least something of everything we are looking at. One of the points is we would be dealing with a company in the area.

Gordon Excused for funeral, Pat Benson recording secretary.

The next step would be system implementation, critical area where proper planning is going to be of utmost importance. The next step would be system modifications and debugging which is the fine tuning that we plan to do on our own.

One audit concept is being pushed now by the federal government and Dick feels that one audit concept will be extended even further. This concept coincides with the block grants for the states.

He would like to get the thoughts and ideas from the Business Committee on these different concepts. Our system is geared for October 1 and we should establish that as our fiscal year. Dick will be coming in again with a recommendation for the next stage for WIPFLI Ullrich.

The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin will apply Indian preference in the selection of the general contractor for this project. Any bid from a qualified Indian owned contracting firm that is in accordance with 25 CFR and is within 5% of the lowest qualified bid will receive preference on this bid.

The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin will give first priority to bids received from qualified contractors containing a work force composed of over 50% Indian employment. The labor force is to include total employees of the general contractor, and employees of subcontractors working on this project.

The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin reserves the right to accept or reject any and all bids on the project and this applies only to the Bingo Building at the Airport.

Gordon moved to approve. Lloyd seconded. Motion Carried.

LAND PURCHASE FOR PURPOSE OF SETTING-UP CIGARETTE OUTLET - Bruce King

The description of the property for sale is on Highway 29 and County Trunk "U". The parcel contains 6.71 acres. Located on the parcel is a ten year old home in good condition. About half of the acreage is wooded. The Public Service Corporation has an easement through the property. Power lines run over their easement. No building built for human habitat may be constructed under the lines. Otherwise there is little restrictions on the use of the land.

The property has good visability from the east on Highway 29 and fair visability from the west. Access on and off 29 would be from Highway "U".

The cost of the parcel with improvements would be \$64,900 plus the buyers share of closing cost. Estimating the cost of an outlet at \$24,00/sq. ft. a five hundred sq. ft. building would cost \$12,000. Driveway's land preparation, etc. should not exceed another \$7,000.

NURSING HOME GUARDIAN EXPENSE



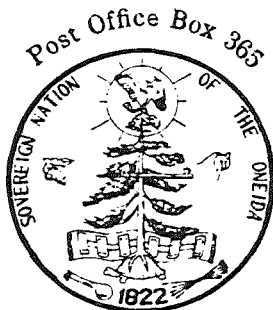

VANDE HEY - Corn on Tribal Land

A meeting was held on August 24, 1982 with Francis Skenandore, Al & Pete VandeHey. "Pete Vande Hey claims he had a five year agreement with Pete Danforth to plant the land, effective from 1977 to 1982. The agreement was that each would share in the profits after expenses. Mr. Vande Hey also stated he was unaware the land was not Pete Danforth's or that it belonged to the Tribe until the meeting this day. Pete Vande Hey did not plant the land this year, but instead gave his rights under the agreement with Pete Danforth to plant the land to his brother Al VandeHey. At the present time Al Vande Hey claims he has invested approximately \$5,123.20 in planting the land. He further claims that the corn planted early may be used as cob corn if the weather continues to hold. The corn planted three weeks later, he claims, may be lost and can or may be salvaged for silage. Al Vande Hey would now prefer to resolve this matter with the Tribe since they are now aware that it is Tribal land and they have to deal with the Tribe." Frank made a motion that the Tribe and Vande Hey share the profits after expenses and have the Land Committee work out the details with the Vande Hey's. Lloyd Seconded. Motion Carried.

Howard and Mark will go to the Land Committee Meeting on September 13, 1982 and explain the situation to the Land Committee if there are any questions.

SEPTEMBER 6, REGULAR MEETING

Wendell moved to have the September 6, 1982 Agenda put on the September 20, 1982 Agenda. Mark seconded. Tony, Mark, Gordon Opposed. Motion Carried.

DISCUSSION ON RECOVERY OF PROPERTY FROM OTDC

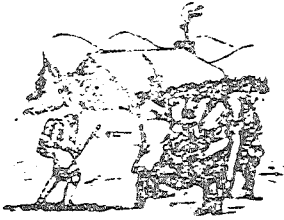

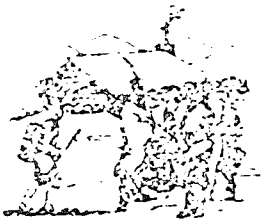
MEMO TO: Oneida Health Board

Thus the Business Committee was obligated to take the necessary action of adopting the attached resolution on behalf of the Oneida General Tribal Council.

The attached resolution specifies the corrective action to be taken. Thus, the Business Committee feels that this action will provide a long term solution to this problem and guarantee the continued delivery of vitally needed health services to our people.

3. Policies and Procedures existing and in practice at the Oneida Health Center are to be consistent with all other policies and procedures directed by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and

WHEREAS, communications, employee and patient morale at the Oneida Health Center have fallen to intolerable levels, due to lack of clarification of the above mentioned policies and procedures, and

WHEREAS, a resolution is currently being developed which clarifies the above mentioned functions of the Oneida Health Board,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Health Board and all individual Health Board members are hereby directed to cease functioning as an Oneida Health Board until a resolution is enacted which defines the above mentioned functions of the Oneida Health Board.

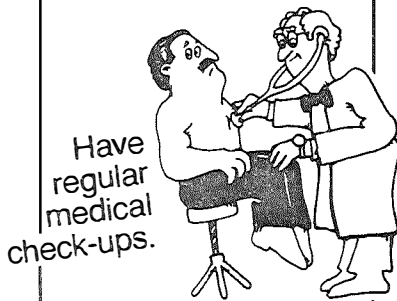
