NAVAJO COMMUNITY COLLEGE
NEWS RELEASE

Tsaile, AZ - One of Oneida's young athletes is emerging into one of the leading collegiate archers in the United States. Daniel Doxtator, 262 W. Mason, Oneida, WI, came to Arizona to attend Navajo Community College the fall of 1983, fell in love with archery and his list of records and achievements has been zooming over since.

Doxtator who has had a touch of football, track and wrestling while in high school

observed the success of the Navajo Community College archery team and decided he would try out. He started from ground "0" in archery experience. His freshman year was a struggle but he hung tough and helped his team win the Arizona State Community College outdoor championship and finished second in the nation at the U.S. Collegiate Archery Championships held at the Olympic Village in Colorado Springs last May.

Doxtator came on tough this year as a sophomore and has established himself as one of the top collegiate archers in the U.S. He set two new Navajo Community College school indoor records in December - a FITA I 286 and a Double FITA I 562. The FITA I is 30 arrows at about 20 yards with a perfect score of 300.

He led his two man collegiate team to a second place, collegiate finish at the massive (over 1,000 shooters and 8 divisions) Tropicana Invitational at Las Vegas, Nevada in January, winning \$600 for his college's archery program while challenging the number one two-year college archer, Jeff Adams from PA, down to the last three arrows.

In February, after having laid out for a week and while still having a sore pulling shoulder, he handily won the first place gold medal at the Arizona State Collegiate Indoor Championships with a 558 Double FITA I which at this point seems to be the top score turned in by a two year college archer in the U.S.

The big season now starts with the state outdoor championships in April, determining who gets to go to the U.S. Collegiate Championships being held at Miami Univ., Oxford, OH, in May. Doxtator's coach, Evan Oswald, feels that should Doxtator's shoulder heal up and hold up for the tough outdoor season he will make a good run for an All-American birth. To get that honor he will have to finish in the top 10 of all University and college shooters. Oswald says, "Doxtator's direction and determination has been only one way this year - up!"

Judging will cover the following areas: Appearance, poise, Indian Characteristics, interests, talent and dedication to the advancement of Indian people.

They will also be judged on authentic tribal dress and modern dress. There will be no swim suit judging.

WINNER WILL:

1. Represent the Oneida Tribe of Wisconsin for one year. This means that the winner will be expected to conduct herself in a manner befitting the Title. During the one-year reign, the Winner may be asked to speak to different groups, to appear on radio and television, and to perform other duties relating to public relations for the Oneida Community.

AWARDS

The Winner will be awarded \$500.00 in cash as well as other gifts.

First and Second runners-up will receive gifts.

NOTE: The First Runner-Up will become Miss Oneida if the winner for some reason is unable to assume the Title. Current title holders will not be accepted for competition.

**JIM THORPE
INDIAN OLYMPIC GAMES**

This year for the first time there will be an all Indian olympic games in tribute to the great Jim Thorpe.

Jim Thorpe, Sac and Fox, was one of the most famous athletes of his time. In 1912 he won 2 olympic gold medals, only to be later disqualified. Previous to the games, Jim Thorpe played semi-professional baseball not knowing that it would taint his status as an amateur athlete. The tragedy and unfairness of this was lamented for many years by Indian people and in 1983, the olympic gold medals were posthumously re-awarded to the family of Jim Thorpe, after 70 years.

The Jim Thorpe Memorial Olympic Games will be held in Los Angeles, California on July 19, through July 22, 1984. The events will include: broadjump, javelin, 200 meter race, discus, 1500 meter race as well as the usual decathlon events. Further details will be in the next issue.

**THE GREAT JIM THORPE
LONGEST RUN**

This run will start from the Onandaga Nation in New York on May 28, 1984. It will end at the Jim Thorpe Memorial Olympic Game in Los Angeles, California on June 20, 1984.

The run is planned through 14 states. It is 3,600 miles to be covered in 53 days. The national team will arrive on the Wisconsin border on June 9, 1984. On June 10, 1984, they will stay in Madison, and on June 11, 1984, they will be in Black River Falls. The Tribes throughout Wisconsin will be participating on this run during the Wisconsin schedule.

Individuals may join the national team or may participate from here.

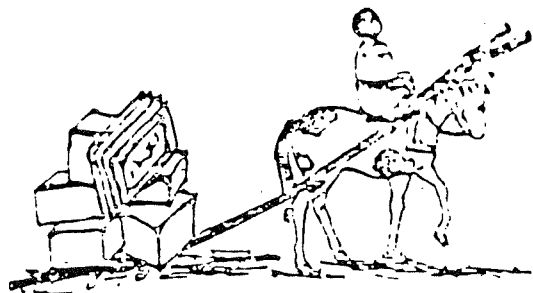

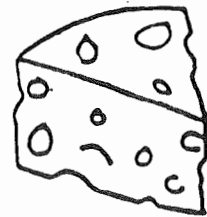
