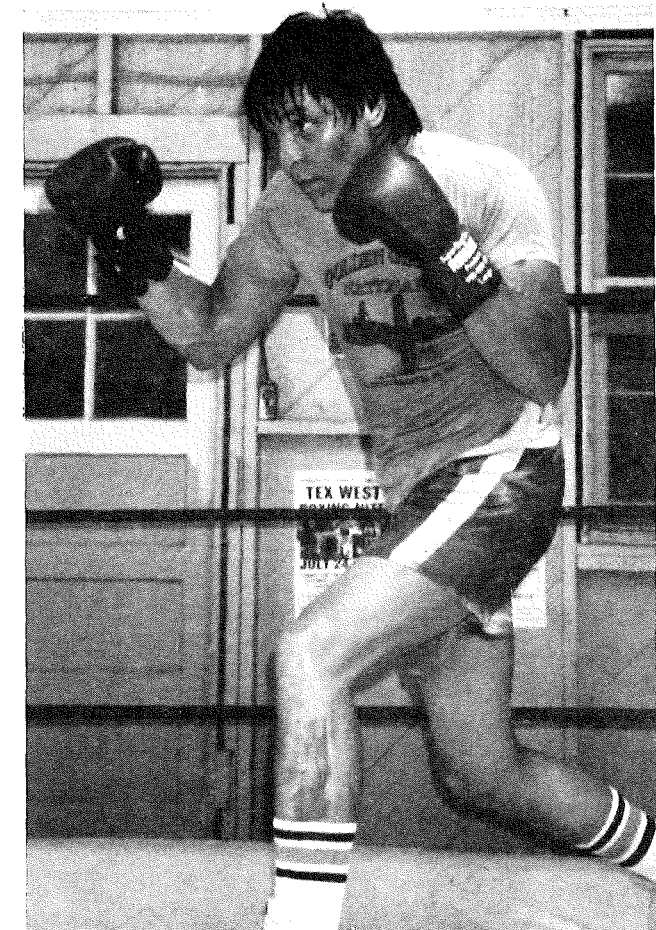

## ★ Joey Christjohn ★ Oneida Man Turns Pro

Dale "Joey" Christjohn "has the old timers talking" according to his trainer Pat Murphy, "they hadn't seen a job like that in a long time." Boxing is in his blood and when Joey left Oneida last year on Labor Day, he left with the intention of turning to professional boxing. He said, "Some-day you'll be reading about me, it's just something I gotta do, I know I can make it."

Since turning pro, Christjohn's latest record is 6-1-1. Among the bouts one was on a professional boxing card at Vallejo, California when he defeated Young Dempsey of Spokane, Washington who came into the ring with a 13-0 record. One of his career's highlights was on the undercard of the Milton McCrory - Don Curry Welter Weight Championship fight in Las Vegas when he scored a unanimous decision over Oliver McCall of Chicago.

"Joey" Christjohn has been a lifelong resident of the Oneida Reservation. He is the son of Amos and Daisy Christjohn. Joe began boxing when he was 13 and continued as an amateur boxer until he decided to leave Oneida as a result of an offer from a California Boxing Club to come out and try professional boxing. With perseverance, time & a lot of dedication Joe has come a long way in the short year he has been away. His current record is 6-1-1 and he will be featured here at Oneida's first professional boxing card on July 4th, at the Norbert Hill Center Gymnasium.

Oneida Man Turns Pro continues

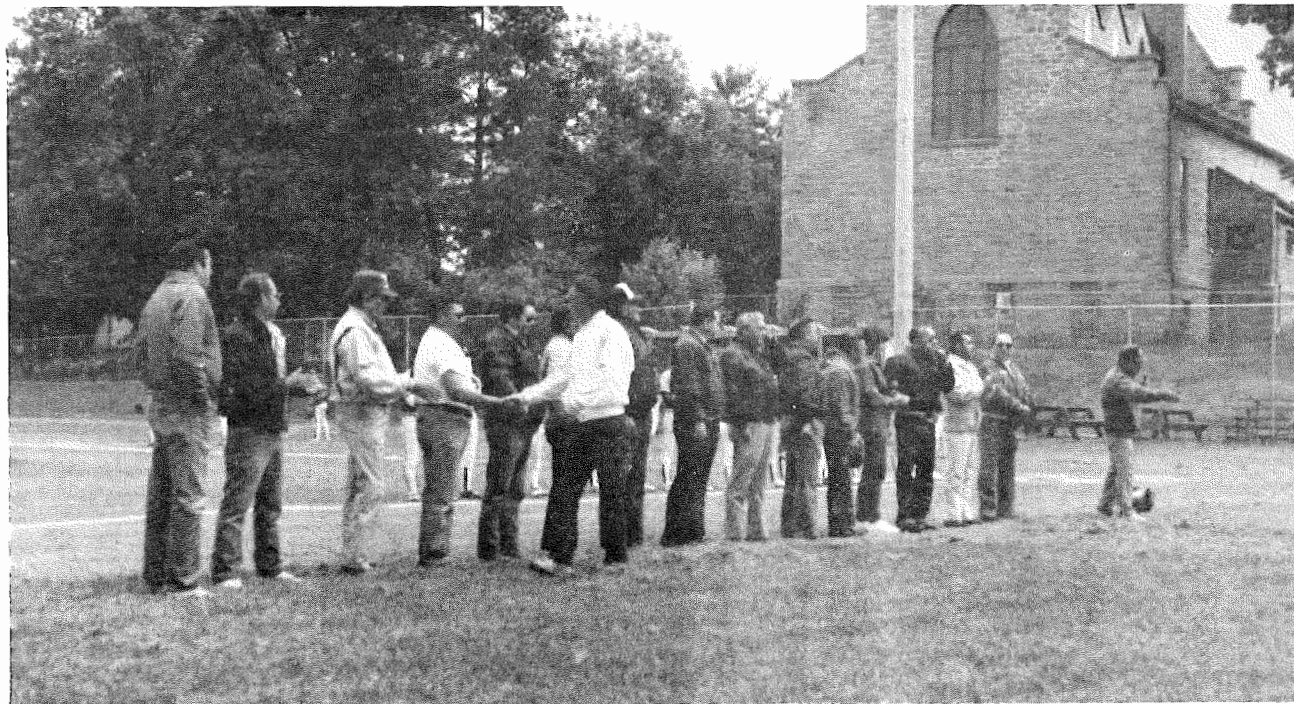
The six bout card will be part of the 14th annual Oneida Pow-Wow and is scheduled to begin at 7 P.M.

The main event will feature Joe Chirstjohn, our hometown boxer at 208 lbs., and Willard Dumas of Cincinnati, Ohio at 235 lbs. It will be an 8 round heavyweight fight between Harvey Betts of Green Bay and Robert Fincher of Milwaukee, a Flyweight bout between Roger Ponfil of Neopit in his debut against Kenny Walker of Cincinnati, (4 rounds); the debut of Scott Downes of Fond Du Lac against Herb Adams of Cincinnati, a heavyweight fight (4 rounds); and a four round heavyweight fight between Farmer Bender of Fond Du Lac against Stan Johnson of Milwaukee; a six round lightweight bout between Bill Betts of Green Bay and Steven Shaney of Cincinnati.

These professional matches will be sanctioned by the Wisconsin State Boxing Commission. Referees, inspectors, and doctors will be assigned by the State Boxing Commission.

### BILL DANFORTH SUNDAY

On Sunday, June 1, 1986 the Oneida Tribe honored William "Bill" Danforth at the Oneida Braves home opener on the Oneida Athletic Field, in Oneida at Hwy. 54 and County Trunk U.

Bill passed away this spring after a short illness but will be long remembered in this community for his contributions to Oneida Athletics. As a number one promoter of community involvement in sports, Bill sponsored several teams in baseball, basketball, golf, bowling, dartball, volleyball, and promoted athletic events for all ages in Oneida as well as Green Bay, Seymour, Freedom, De Pere, and the surrounding areas.

As a young man Bill was best remembered for his accomplishments as a baseball player, and in later years as an exceptional coach who led the Oneida Team to Dairyland League victories in 1971 and 1974. Bill was the son of the late Pete and Sabie Danforth.

Before the game, there was a brief ceremony to honor Danforth who was involved in all aspects of sports for nearly 40 years. The ceremony included an introduction of the Braves, and some of the former players that were playing with Bill at some time in his career, and a tribal resolution and plaque was presented by Oneida Tribal Chairman Purcell Powless to Bill's wife Erma Danforth, who then threw out the first ball to start the home season. This was a day to remember for all who attended.

## ONEIDA TRIBAL ARBOR DAY SET FOR JUNE 14, 1986

The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin will observe its first Arbor Day June 14, 1986, by distributing 1500 hardwood trees to both Tribal and non-Tribal residents of the Oneida Reservation. The reservation encompasses more than 65,000 acres along the Brown and Outagamie borders and the part of Green Bay, west of Taylor Street.

Distribution of the trees will take place between 10 am and 2 pm at the Oneida Health Center at County Trunk E & EE in Outagamie County after a brief tree planting ceremony to commemorate the Tribe's first Arbor Day observation. The ceremony will see the planting of two cherry trees and marks the beginning of a Tribal effort to establish a cherry orchard and wildlife conservation area near the Anna John Nursing Home which is adjacent to the Health Center.

The resolution is being introduced to establish an Oneida Tribal Arbor Day as the first Saturday in June in future years, states the purpose of the observance is to beautify the Oneida Reservation and create a conservation area; to raise funds for the cherry orchard and wildlife conservation area at the nursing home; to create good will between the Tribe and non-tribal residents within the reservation boundaries. The Anna John Nursing Home and the Oneida Health Center serve both Indians and non-Indians of the area.

While the trees will be distributed free of charge on a first come, first serve basis, each family will be asked to donate 50¢ per tree toward the development of the orchard and wildlife conservation area. Each family will be limited to two trees.



Special arrangements have been made for senior citizens of the reservation who are unable to get to the Health Center. They may call the Oneida Recreation Center at (414) 869-1088 for free delivery and planting. They are NOT expected to donate to the fund.

The trees are being donated by McKay Nurseries of Madison, the largest nursery in the state. Included for distribution will be 200 Paper Birch, 200 River Birch, 400 Honey Locust, (all each 2-3 feet tall), 300 Mountain Ash and 400 Green Ash. McKay Nurseries is providing the first 4-5 foot tall cherry tree to begin establishing the orchard free of charge to the Oneida Tribe.

Planting instructions will be given at the time of pick-up of the trees.

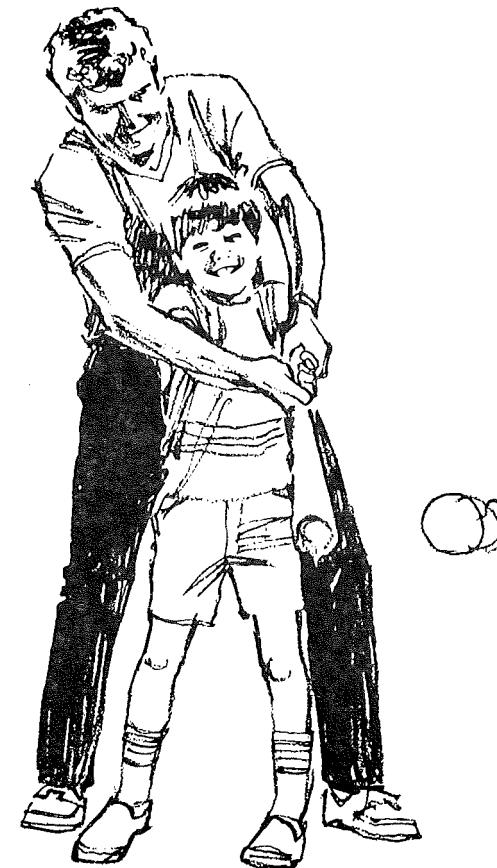

We have received quite a few bills from individuals for emergency services. Many of these needs could have been served at the Oneida Health Center. I would like to inform you of several services available to you at the Oneida Community Health Center.

For emergency services, we have a 24-hour, 7-day a week, Rescue Service for conditions of sudden onset, or of such severity as to require immediate medical care. Call **469-9777 or 911** if in that service area.

For medical care after hours, we have an answering service, **437-6007**. This number is also available by calling the Health Center, **869-2711**, in which case a recording gives the information needed. This service will have the physician on-call contact you for your health care needs. The physicians have medical privileges at ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL as it is not practicable for them to serve at all three hospitals. **If you need to use the emergency room, you MUST NOTIFY ME WITHIN 72 HRS. to be covered by contract.**

Our policy for payment of health services not provided at this facility, requires referrals from the health provider, or health disciplines (Physicians, Dentists, or Pharmacist), **from this facility.** Please use our Health Center physicians for any follow-up needed after an emergency.

if you are eligible for Medicare, Medical Assistance or private insurance, **YOU MUST UTILIZE THESE RESOURCES FIRST.**

In the future, for financial assistance from contract patient care, utilization of provided services and the referral system is necessary.

Tribal staff successfully initiated negotiation with Indian Health Services to decrease the amount of paper-work and reporting that we were being required to do each month. The new format will save much staff time, effort and copying cost.

A revision was made in the Maternal Child Health (M.H.C.) grant that enabled us to hire a part-time health educator. She works primarily at developing a health curriculum for the Tribal School.

Progress in all program areas has been accomplished with the dedication and commitment of the entire Oneida Community Health Center staff.

## ONEIDA BUSINESS COMMITTEE PLANNING REPORT

The Oneida Planning cycle, which is the result of a strategic Planning Retreat held by the Business Committee in August of 1985 has been functioning for the past three months. Led by members of the Business Committee, all planning groups have met three times and their work already had an impact on the proposed 1986-87 budget.

Some outcomes for which action plans are being developed are highlighted the following.

Priorities have been established in developing an integrated approach to our business planning. Some of these are warehousing facilities, expansion of the print shop and further development of the Airport Site.

Efforts are underway to develop a Career Center for Tribal Members which will provide for a career continuum beginning with education thru employment. Coordination of this center with the personnel department to establish and maintain a tribal skills inventory is a goal.

The planning teams will lead the updating of the Tribal Comprehensive Plan. Along with this, a value analysis approach to Tribal Operations will help the Business Committee make budgeting decisions.

Next years proposed budget will reflect defined retained equity funding, an internal auditing program and funding for language and culture. A Day Care program is being provided this summer for the first time. The employee retirement program will become a reality this fall.

Also underway is the development of a Communications Department which will be comprised of the Kalihwi-saks, Public Relations and Teleconferencing.

We are attempting to get a Foster Treatment Home in operation this summer. This will initially be for teen-aged boys but will be expanded if successful. Health promotion and prevention has been highlighted for emphasis next year also.

An evaluation of the recreation program is planned for this summer along with a grant proposal to upgrade our designated parks.

Other planning items have been personnel policies and procedures, a new land acquisition plan, development of the Public Safety Department and the Tribal Motor Pool.

In the area of Legal and Governmental concerns have been the New York Land Claims, maximizing the tribes tax status, and the development of an appeals board.

As you can see, the Business Committee has been very busy. Not only have things been discussed, but they are happening and further action plans are being developed. The Committee will be doing an evaluation of the planning teams on June 5th. At that time, the future direction of the process will be determined. Also being developed is a way to get community input into the process. Community members who have ideas along these lines, or who wish to comment on the process are encouraged to contact any member of the Business Committee with your thoughts.

## REPORT TO THE ONEIDA INDIAN PEOPLE

We are pleased to report on the programs and activities of the Oneida Community Health Center. This report covers the 1985 Contract year; October 1, 1984 thru September 30, 1985.

Mandatory Tuberculosis screening for all tribal employees, volunteers, RNIP employees and students was approved and implemented during the year. The T.B. situation continues to be a concern, although fewer new cases are being identified.

We have contracted with a Green Bay consultant firm to modify and improve our computer billing package. All work was completed on this project during the year, and the system is functional although the project took longer to complete than initially anticipated.

The Family Service and Chemical Dependency Programs were certified by the State of Wisconsin as an out-patient psychotherapy program and out-patient treatment program respectively. This accomplishment enables us to bill Medical Assistance for approved services.

A management study, a medical records assessment, and a Joint Commission Accreditation of Hospitals pre-survey were all completed during this year. The focus of the recommendations of these studies were on improving administration/management and quality of care and services to clients. We have implemented many of the recommendations in preparation for accreditation. A property inventory was completed by Indian Health Service identifying all Health Center and tribal equipment in our possession.

Lee Craig, M.D., completed his term as Medical Director May 23, 1985. Recruitment efforts began immediately, and Christopher Watson, M.D., was hired in July and assumed the position of Medical Director in October.

A Tribal Specific Health Plan (a long-term and short-term plan) was completed with appropriate input from the Health Board and Business Committee in July. It will be updated/revised yearly to reflect the health needs of the Oneida Tribe.

A new telephone system was installed at the Health Center in July after many months of problems with the old system. Many of our communication problems were alleviated at that time.

Our immunization level declined (below the targeted 90%) during this year due to the staff turnover in the Community Health Nursing Department. Diligent efforts were made to improve our levels with the hiring of a full staff in the department.

## POLICY

### Contract Health Services

THE FOLLOWING IS THE POLICY OF THE ONEDIA COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER IN REGARDS TO THOSE SERVICES NOT AVAILABLE AT OUR CLINIC. ALL INDIVIDUALS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR DIRECT CARE AT THE CLINIC. PAYMENT FOR SERVICES WILL BE DETERMINED ON SERVICES PROVIDED IF NOT ELIGIBLE.

CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES (CHS) ARE HEALTH SERVICES THAT ARE NOT PROVIDED AT THE HEALTH CENTER

#### ELIGIBILITY FOR CHS:

1. Members of the Oneida Tribe who live in the CHS delivery area (CHSDA) of Brown and Outagamie Counties.
2. Members of other federally recognized tribes who reside within the boundaries of the Oneida Reservation.
3. Members of other federally recognized tribes who reside within the CHS delivery area of Brown and Outagamie Counties, but not within the boundaries of the Oneida Reservation, will be served when determined by Tribal Administration and the Health Board, to have close economic and social ties with the Reservation.

It has been determined that "CLOSE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL TIES" are defined to be only:

1. Non-Oneida Indians employed by the Oneida Tribe
  - a. Including Indian spouse and Indian children
2. Non-Oneida Indian widow or widower of a marriage to an Oneida Indian, and non-Oneida Indian children of this family
3. Non-Oneida Indian children of a non-Oneida Indian spouse divorced from an Oneida Indian, providing custody of the children is retained by either the non-Oneida Indian spouse or the Indian spouse
4. Non-Oneida Indian children adopted by Oneida families

CHS will be available to the following, providing the above eligibility standards are met:

1. A student or transient who are temporarily absent from their residence, as follows:
  - a. Students--during their full-time attendance at programs of vocational, technical, or academic education, including normal school breaks, such as vacations, semester or other scheduled breaks occurring during their attendance, and for a period not to exceed 180 days after the completion of the course of study.
  - b. Transients (persons who are in travel or are temporarily employed, such as seasonal or migratory workers), during their absence.
  - c. Other persons outside the Oneida CHSDA. Persons who leave and are neither students nor transients will be eligible for CHS for a period not to exceed 180 days from such departure.
2. Foster Children--Indian children who are placed in foster care outside the Oneida CHSDA by order of the court of competent jurisdiction and who are eligible for CHS at the time of the court order, shall continue to be eligible for CHS while in foster care.

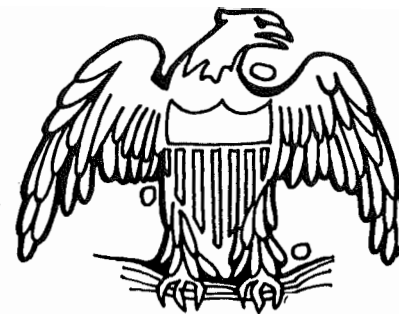

## BRACES, continued

Some patients are able to wear the newer "invisible" braces that attach to the inside (lingual) surfaces of the teeth. However, these appliances are more expensive than traditional braces, take longer to adjust to, and are still considered experimental by many practitioners. In short, they're not for everyone.

No matter what type of orthodontic appliance is worn, say dentists, a rigorous oral hygiene program is essential to ensure good oral health. Unprotected surfaces of teeth and spaces under bands are prone to collecting plaque -- that invisible deposit of harmful bacteria that constantly forms on teeth.

If plaque is not regularly removed, teeth may become permanently spotted and discolored around the appliances, and may even become decayed. That's why daily brushing and flossing, regular professional dental cleanings and examinations, and a carefully chosen diet of foods that won't harm teeth or braces are especially important at this time.

Because of the growing popularity of braces, there's no longer any reason to avoid needed orthodontic treatment. You too can set straight any number of dental irregularities, overbite, crowded, crooked or gapped teeth - by bracing your teeth for a lifetime of healthy smiles.

Dental staff at the Oneida Dental Clinic will refer patients in need of orthodontic treatment to the appropriate specialist after a review of their overall oral health care needs. While contract care funds are not available for orthodontic therapy, we will assist you in the evaluation of proposed orthodontic treatment plans.

## HOME SAFETY SURVEY FOR SENIORS PLANNED

A federal grant has been received by the Oneida Tribe for the performance of home safety surveys. These surveys will be conducted in homes owned or occupied by senior citizens. The purpose of the survey is to identify safety hazards in the home, discuss methods for correction of those hazards and to obtain an accident history for the last six months from the home occupant. 150 homes have been targeted for the survey.

We hope that upon completion of the survey, the results can be used for obtaining further grants to correct problems found.

The survey is scheduled to begin on June 15, and to be finished on August 15. Five pairs of surveyors will be making the surveys. We expect that each survey will take 2-3 hours to complete. Please cooperate with the surveyors. If all our goals are met for the survey, we will be able to reduce accidental injuries that occur in those homes surveyed. Remember, accidents are the number ONE cause of death for Indian people.

If you have any questions about the survey or wish to make sure that your home is included (remember, all homes with a senior citizen occupant are eligible for the survey), please contact Rosemary Gregor at the Multi-Purpose Center.

### BRACE YOURSELF, FOR A HEALTHY SMILE

Each year, close to 5 million children and adults receive orthodontic treatment to correct problems with the way their teeth fit together. They've learned that a bad bite, or malocclusion, can affect more than their appearance. It also can compromise dental and general health.

Correcting orthodontic problems is important because teeth that are out of position are often more difficult to clean; therefore at greater risk of dental disease.

A poor bite may put extra stress on the chewing muscles, causing pain and problems with the jaw joints. Also, if chewing is difficult or uncomfortable, people may not eat the foods they need for good nutrition.

Malocclusions can be treated at almost any age. In fact, it is estimated that today one out of every five patients receiving orthodontic treatment is an adult.

Although more adults now realize the value of wearing "braces", young people remain the prime candidates for this type of dental work. This is because after children reach about age 14, their teeth become harder to move into an ideal position. Jaw and facial growth begin to level off at this age. It is estimated that at least half of all children between the ages of 12 and 17 have crooked or crowded teeth that could benefit from orthodontic treatment.

Nevertheless, adults can greatly benefit too. They may have to wear "braces" for up to six months longer than a young person would (with average treatment length ranging from 24 to 36 months), but many adult patients are better motivated and more cooperative than are teen patients.

What causes teeth to become misaligned in the first place? In most cases, malocclusion is caused by inherited factors, such as the relationship between the size of teeth and jaws. Other types of malocclusion are acquired through poor oral habits, such as thumb sucking and tongue thrusting, or as a result of missing teeth.

Dentists use various appliances to move teeth into the correct position. These appliances work by putting gentle, yet constant pressure on the teeth and jaws, causing them to move into proper alignment. What type of appliance is used depends on the patient's particular problems and special needs.

Most orthodontic patients wear "braces", a nonremovable combination of metal or plastic bands, brackets, and wires. The brackets may be bonded with a liquid resin directly onto the teeth, or metal bands that include a bracket may be cemented around the teeth. Each bracket is then connected to its neighbor by an archwire, which is tightened and periodically adjusted to push or pull teeth into the desired position.

### THE CONFERENCE

The Oneida Nation History Conference will mark the first time ever that a comprehensive history of the Oneida Nation will be told. The format of the conference will be unique because it will blend scholarly research reflecting the ethnohistorical approach with the highly personal narrative oral tradition native to the Oneida culture. The result will be a rich, insightful, compelling and complete re-telling of the history of one of the more interesting native American cultures in the United States.

The conference will bring together historical scholars, anthropologists, archeologists and linguists from across the nation. Firm commitments have been received from many distinguished individuals representing eminent organizations such as the Smithsonian Institution, the D'Arcy McNickle Center for the History of the American Indian at the Newberry Library in Chicago, Marquette University of Milwaukee, the State University of New York, the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and the Native American Rights Fund. In addition, the presentors will include a diverse group of local historians, community leaders, Oneida elders and residents of the area to provide a unique, first person narrative perspective to the research of the scholars.

The Oneida Nation History Conference will explore Oneida history from the earliest contact with Europeans (C. 1500) to the present. Each of the scholars who have agreed to participate are trained in the ethnohistorical approach to American Indian history. Most of these scholars have worked with the Oneida Tribe or with tribal members in various capacities in the recent past.

The three-day conference is outlined inside this brochure, along with registration information, a registration blank, conference hotel information and registration rates. The hotel, as you will note, is the newest economic development venture of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin. It is a modern 202 room conference facility, located on tribal lands immediately across from Green Bay's Airport. The hotel, a Rodeway Inn, will open less than 60-days before the onset of the conference. It is located in a wooded area that offers hiking trails and immediate adjacency to the famous Oneida Bingo.

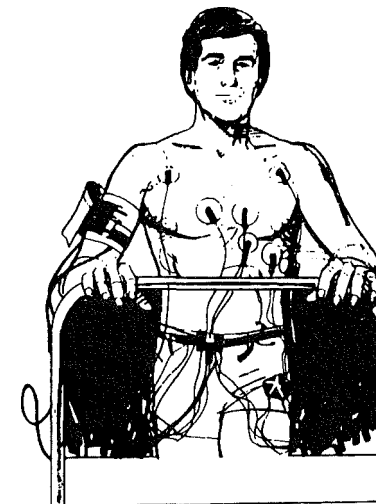
## COMMUNITY HEALTH NEWS
