TO THE EDITOR:

Green Bay Transit wishes to announce the following changes to the existing bus route schedule.

Effective August 1, 1983:

Addition of a new West side route called "West Side Connection".

This new route provides north-south oriented service to the west side's major shopping centers and medical facilities. In addition, this new route provides direct service to Velp Avenue residents.

Route description:

Route 16 - West Side Connection (new).

The route begins at the Adams Street Transitway Zone "C", north to Pine, east to Jefferson, south to Cherry, east to Madison, north to Main, west to Broadway, north to Mather, west to Velp, west to Locust, south to Bond, west to Military, south to West Mason, east to west entrance into Green Bay Plaza parking lot, south through parking lot to exit onto Sixth Street, west to Military, south to Lombardi, east to Oneida, south to south entrance into Bay Park Square at Ward's Auto Center, to Ward's, passing in front of Mall and Shopko and to exit onto Willard Drive, to Oneida, north to Lombardi, west to Military, north to Sixth, east to entrance into Green Bay Plaza, north to four-way stop at center of lot, west to Military, north to Bond, east to Locust, north to Velp, east to Mather, east to Broadway, south to Dousman, east to Washington Way, south to Pine, east to Washington, south to Cherry, east to Adams to Zone "C".

This route will detour one trip in the morning on the outbound trip at 8:15 A.M. Outbound detour will begin at Bond and Military, north on Military to Stiles, west to Morley, south to Bond, east to Military, south to regular route. One more detour will be in effect at 3:45 P.M. (leaving Ward's), detour begins at Bond and Military, south on Military to Stiles, west to Morley, south to Bond, east to Military and continue east to regular route.

2. Revision of Edison Route (Elimination of East Town Loop Route)

The unproductive East Town Loop will be eliminated, and the Edison Route revised and consolidated.

(DIRECT EMPLOYMENT)

What is it? How does it work? Is it still available? Where do I go to get help if I qualify? These are many of the questions people ask as they attempt to answer the difficult question of: "How do I get started on my new job?"

Actually the relocation program is an old title for a newer program entitled "The Direct Employment Program" or as some of you may know it, the "D.E." program.

In earlier days, the former BIA administered relocation program used to transport eligible individuals to various cities to seek out employment. However this proved not to be always cost effective and at times prone to abuse. Subsequent regulation changes in the way Oneida contracted the program have led to the following eligibility guidelines for Oneida's D.E., program:

1. Adult Indians $\frac{1}{2}$ degree Oneida residing on or near reservation.
2. Must have already secured full-time permanent employment.
3. Applicants must be unemployed.
4. Applicants are eligible up until they received their first full paycheck.

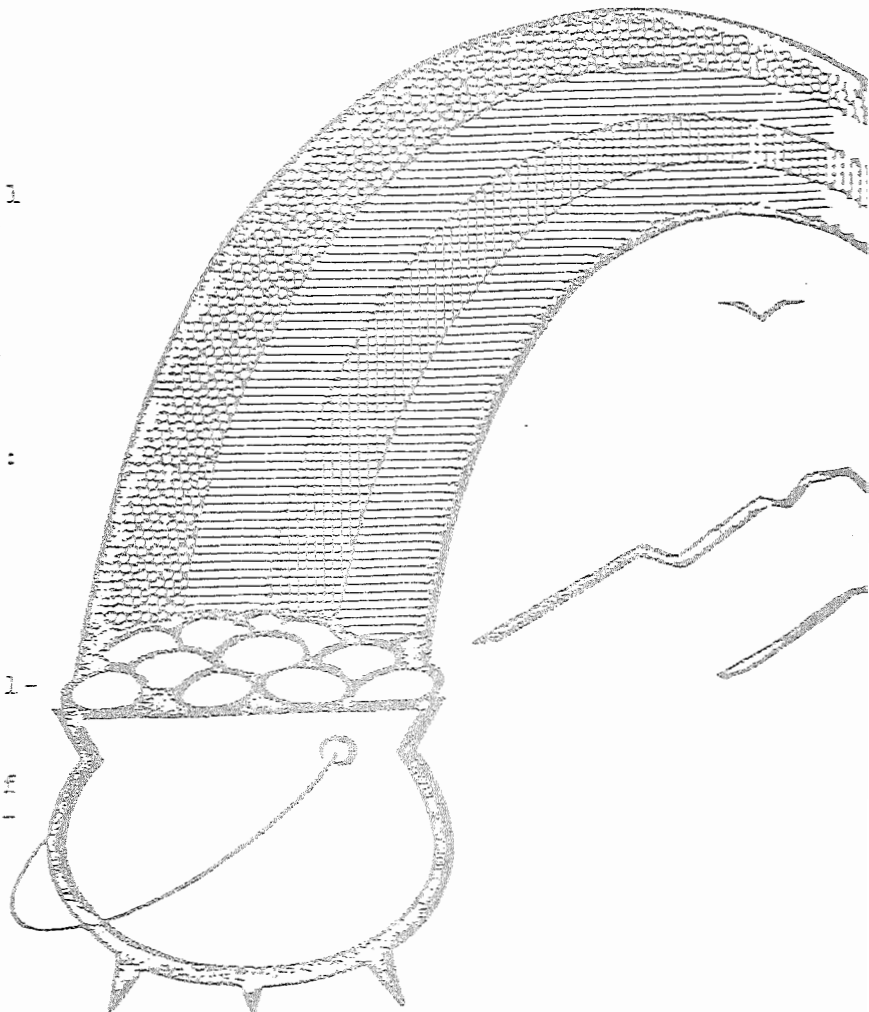
Yes, the program still services on a limited basis and is available by applying in the Oneida Education office. Information to bring along if you believe you qualify would be:

1. Job title,
2. Beginning wage
3. date to start work
4. first paycheck
5. First full payday and
6. A statement that the job is full-time and permanent.

Relocation assistance can be part of the D.E. program when actual relocation is necessary due to a required move for the purpose of secured employment. What you may qualify for depends on many factors so for

I felt they were trying to strike back at the Tribe, the Business Committee in particular. However, when someone pointed out to me what was said in regard to us having a "day off", a sign of respect for one of our most respected leaders; a man that gave practically half his life serving this Tribe; I personally, will miss him a lot, because I worked with him and saw him just about every day- so, when I read this I was stunned by the audacity of this person or persons to challenge a whole Tribe's manner of last respects to a wonderful person. I truly cannot believe a person could be this hateful and bitter but apparently I am very wrong. I really feel pity for this person (persons) and for any of you that can actually admit in public to being a party to any part of this. The rest of this so called paper is filled with half truths and innuendo's and anyone with any integrity and intelligence can only laugh at anything that is written therein. I for one will only throw any further copies of this where it belongs - in a trash can without being read.

I really felt it was not worth my time to respond to anything written before but this is of a personal nature to me and I felt it was totally without feeling for anyone concerned when this was written. I write this through my own conscience and I finally felt it was my duty to myself and to others in my immediate family to publicly state my feelings.

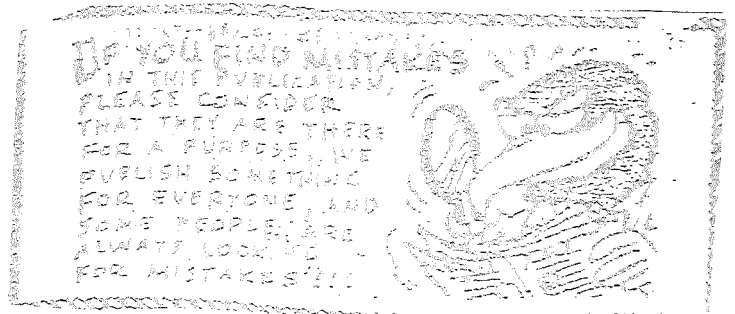

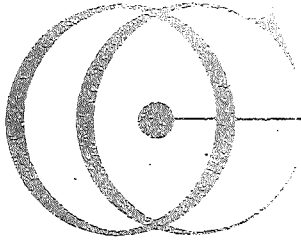

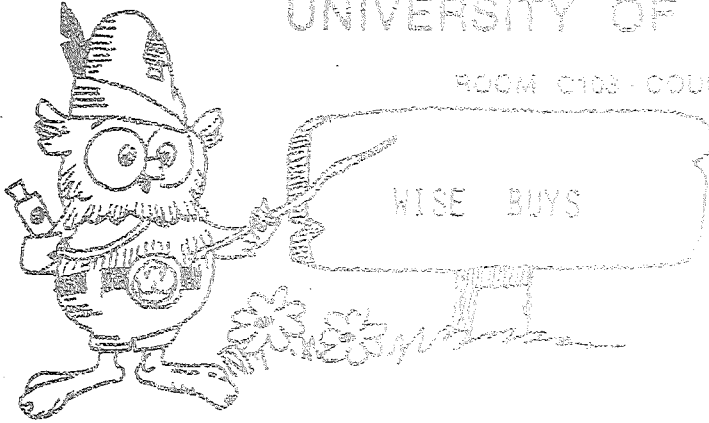
