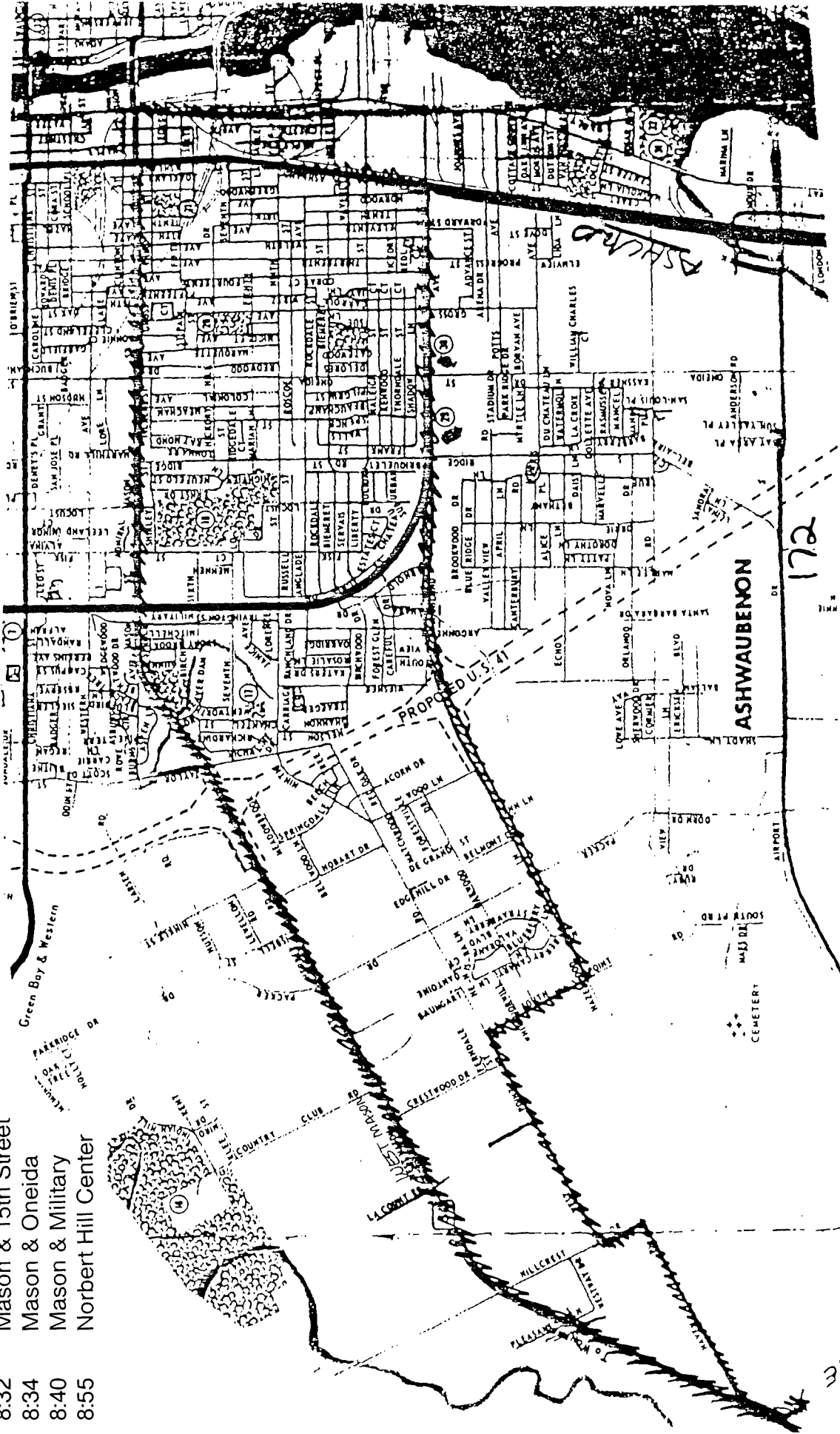

Work Starts On Site For Oneida Hotel

Mortgage papers for \$8.3 million in loans from local financial institutions were signed last week. The loans were packaged by the State Bank of De Pere. The remainder of the cost will be financed through a federal grant and private equity funding.

Site preparation was scheduled to begin today for construction of the new Oneida Roadway Inn across from Austin Straubel Airport.

Bids for construction of the 202-room hotel were opened May 22. Contracts for the \$10.5 million project have been awarded to Gauthier and Sons Construction Inc. for setting grades, stump and tree removal and the installation of storm drains, and to Green Bay Structural Steel for the steel and steel construction work.

Construction of the three-story concrete and wood building is expected to be completed prior to June 1, 1986.

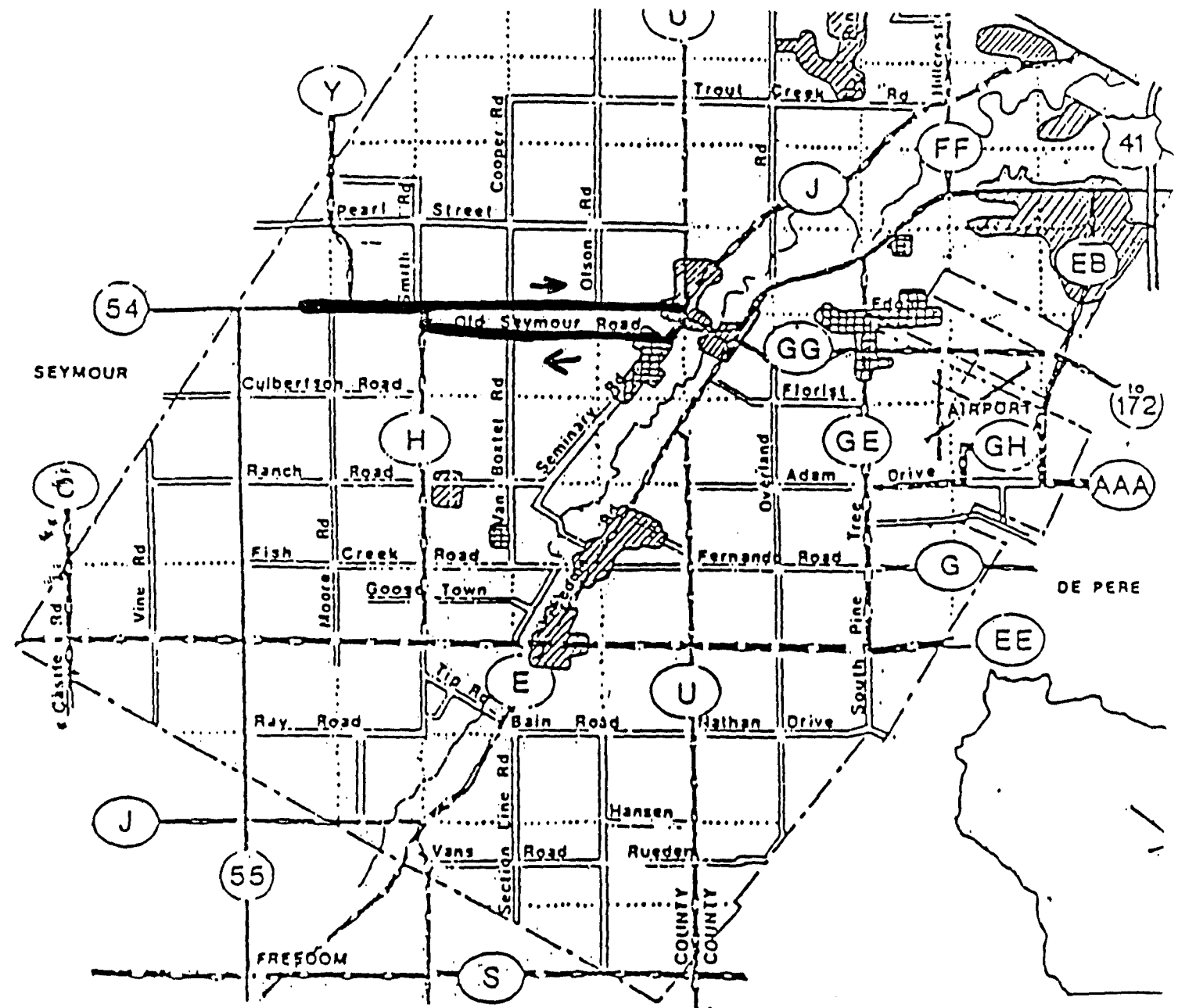
Work on the sewer and water lines to the site started over a month ago. The Russ Nelson Construction Co. of Cobb is extending sewer lines from Kimberly and Buffalo Streets in Ashwaubenon and water lines from the corner of South Point and West Point roads.

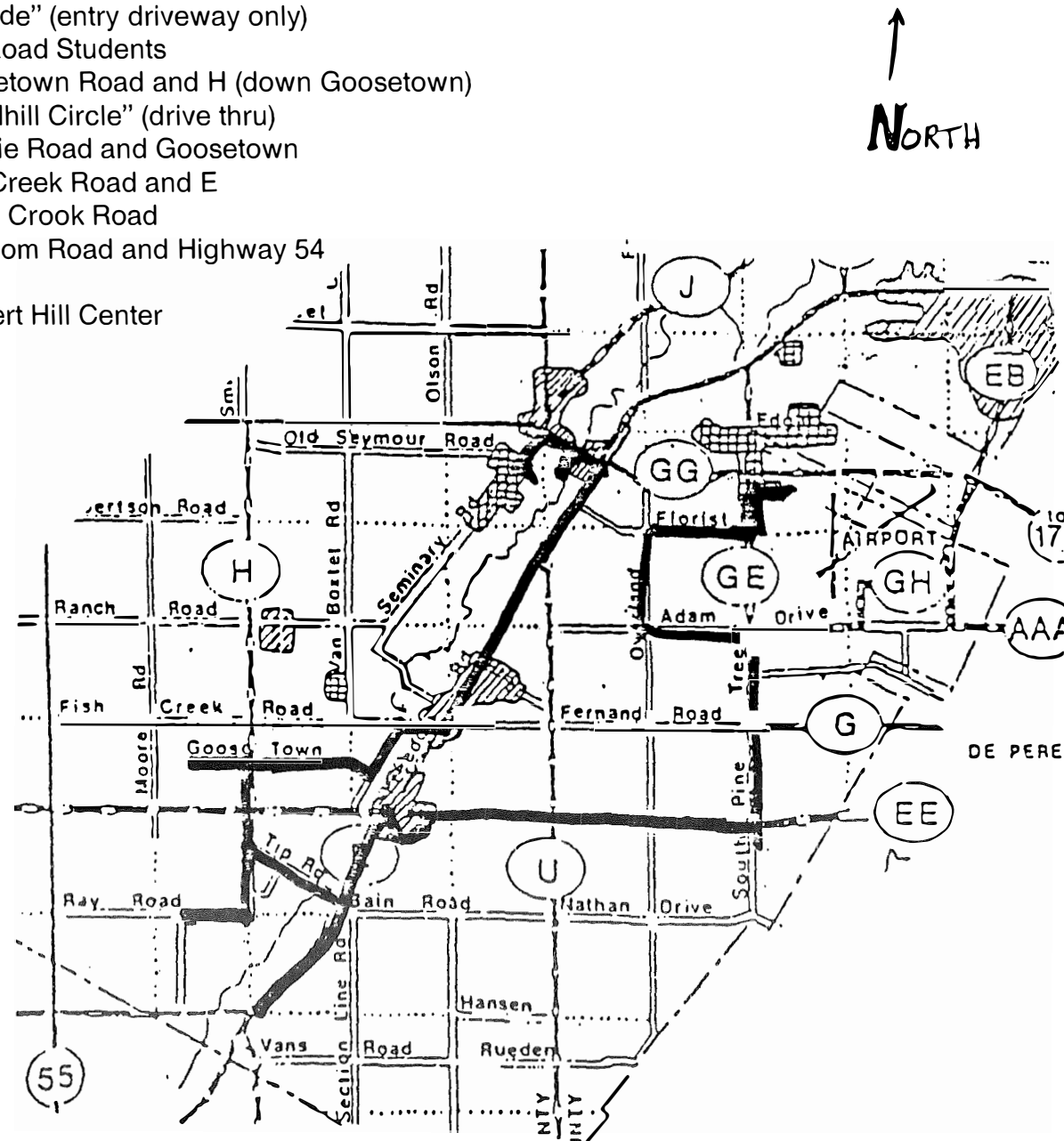

Construction Work Began on the Oneida Rodeway Inn

Construction work began on the Oneida Rodeway Inn on Wednesday, June 5, 1985. Gauthier Construction of Green Bay has been issued a letter to proceed on the sitework and storm water drainage. Gauthier is shown here working the access road into the site. (1A) Other contracts for construction will be issued through the rest of June. Bids for the project were opened May 22. The total of all the low bids received were within the budgeted amount and meant that construction could begin.

Work is also progressing fine on the installation of water and sewer mains to the Activity Center and Hotel site. (2A) Russ Nelson Construction of Cobb, Wisconsin has this job. The sewer lines have to travel over 1½ miles to reach the site. Part of the project shown here involved digging up a residential street in Ashwaubenon to replace some smaller sewer pipe. Nelson Construction worked along Airport Drive during the week of June 6th. Their portion of the project should be finished by mid-July. The Economic Development Administration (EDA) has provided a \$500,000 grant to the Tribe toward the total cost of \$840,000 for the sewer and water installation. (3A)

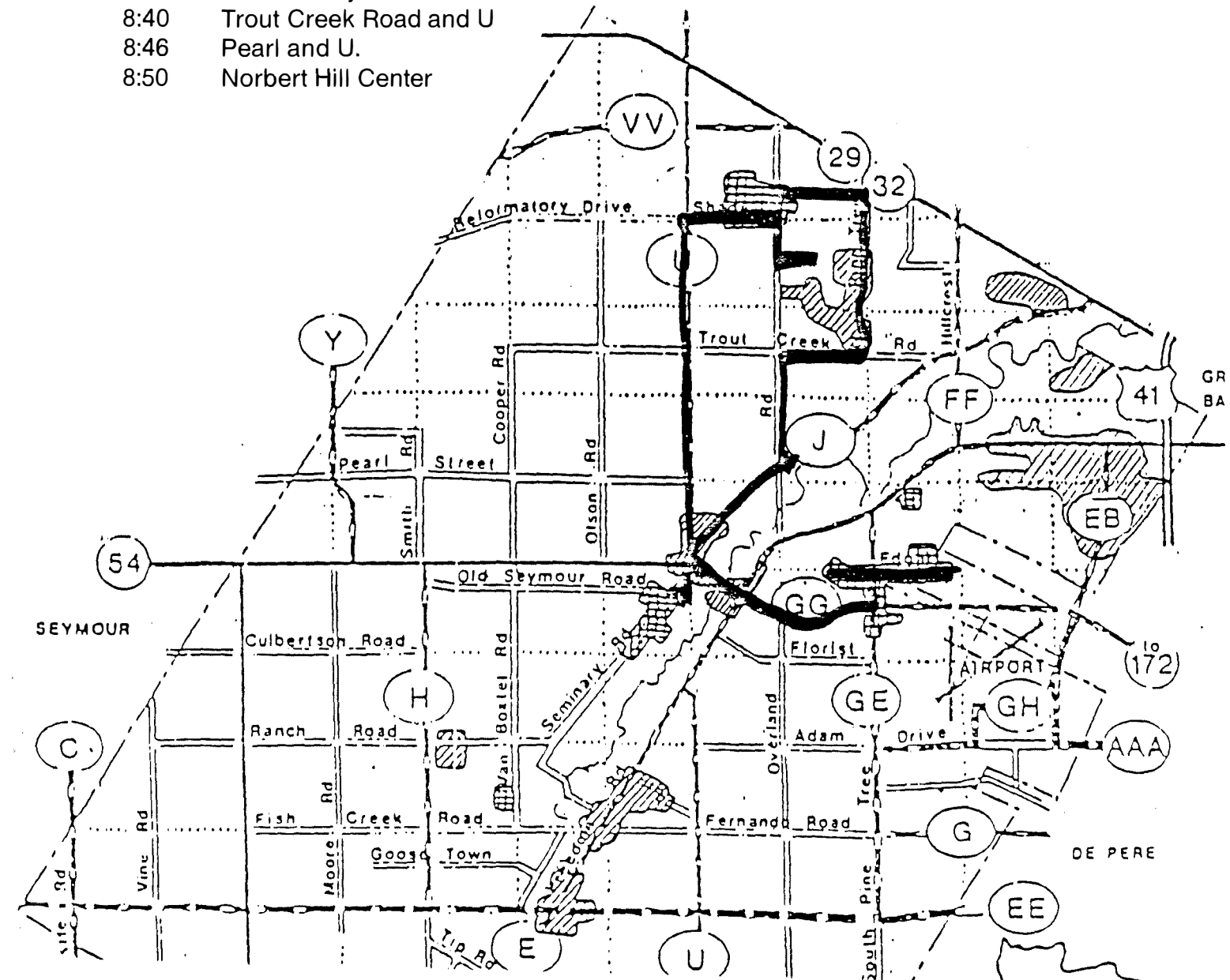

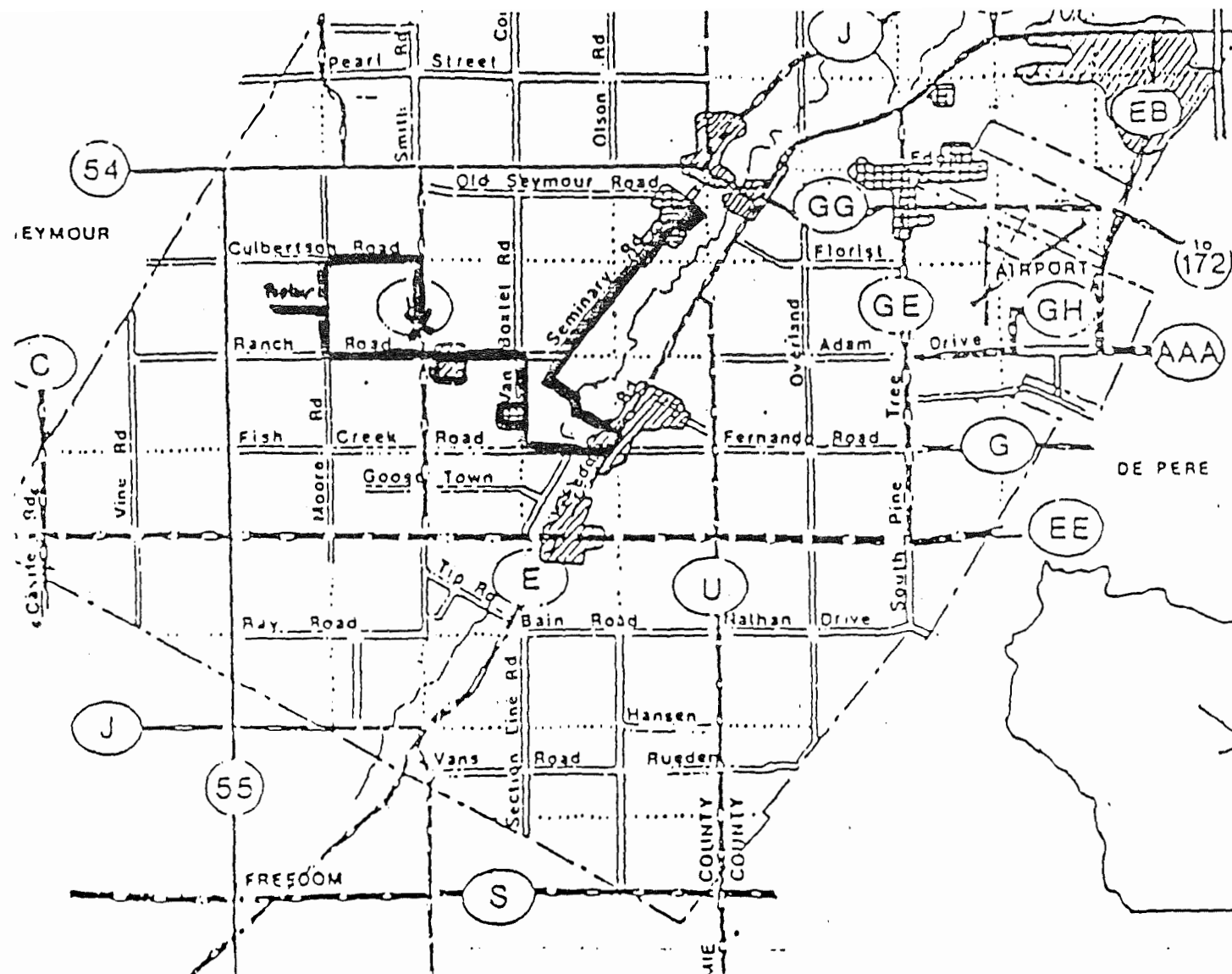

I Believe in God

There is a God. This should be self-evident to all men. However, sometimes those who profess to believe in God, deny Him by the kind of lives they live. They live as though there is no God nor a judgement of the evil deeds that they commit (Acts 17:31). If I really believe in God, I will live my life in harmony with His will. But why should I believe in God? I can not see, feel, hear or smell him for He is a spirit (John 4:24). In Hebrews 11:1 it says, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." Faith in God is not a blind step in the dark. But we believe in God because there is evidence for such a faith. Let us look at some of the evidence.

First, there is a universal belief in a Divine Being and a universal religious instinct among all nations. Throughout the world's history, man has believed in a supernatural being. It is difficult to explain how there is a general belief in something that does not exist. There must be a God to compliment this craving and belief. In Psalms 42:1 it reads, "As the deer pants for the water brooks, so pants my soul for you, O God."

Second, there is a cause for everything that happens. A forest fire does not start all by itself. Someone or something had to start it. What started this great universe? Should we believe it created itself by accident? In Hebrews 3:4 it says, "For every house is built by someone, but He who built all things is God." God is the first cause. But who created God? No one, for he has always existed. To believe in an eternal God, who created the world, is more reasonable than to believe it came about by chance as evolutionist teach. Something can not come from nothing. Where did life come from? Louis Pasteur proved years ago that life does not arise from non-life, but evolution demands that life arise from non-life. Yet scientists can not create life in a test tube even under favorable conditions. A Supreme Being **must** have created all things.

Third, I believe in God because someone had to design this universe. If there is design, there must also be a designer. If you found a watch in the woods, you would not conclude that it just came into being by itself. You would know that someone had to design it. There is great design in the universe. If our earth were any closer to the sun we would melt. If the moon were any closer to the earth, our tides would be so large they would cover all continents twice a day. Our bodies have marvelous design. In Psalms 139:4 it reads, "I will praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made..." God is the designer of this universe.

Fourth, have you ever considered that man unlike the animals can enjoy the beauty of a waterfall or sunset? Animals have no appreciation for beauty. Why is it that this earth seems to have been designed to appeal to man's ability to appreciate beauty? Why are flowers so elegant? Why do birds sing so pleasantly? The answer is found in the reality that God made man and He made the world for man's happiness (Genesis 1:29-31). I believe in God because there is evidence to substantiate that belief.

It is much more reasonable and believable to believe in God, who created all else, than to believe all else came about by accident or chance. Do you believe in God? Then read His word and find out more about Him and what He can do for your life.

Infant and Child Safety Seat Program Underway

The Oneida Infant and Child Auto Safety Seat Program has been underway for about two months, and is progressing well. To date, 35 new seats are in use.

We would encourage all those who need seats to take advantage of this program, as the purchase of a safety seat for your child is one of the best investments you can make.

Prior to purchasing a seat, an educational film must be viewed by anyone buying the seat. No seat can be sold prior to the purchaser viewing the film. Seeing the film in the hospital is not sufficient to meet this requirement.

To make it easier for you to meet this requirement, a schedule for viewing the film has been developed. The film will be available for viewing all day on the 1st Monday and Tuesday of each month (WIC check days) at the Oneida Health Center. The film will also be shown at the Amerindian Center on Friday of WIC week.

Hours the film will be available there are 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The film will be shown only for emergencies during other times, so plan your schedules accordingly.

After viewing the film, the seat may be purchased at any time during regular office hours.

SMOKE DETECTORS AVAILABLE

The Oneida Tribe has received a BIA Grant for smoke alarms for Tribal members.

These smoke detectors are available on a first-come, first-served basis from the Environmental Health Department. They are available to all Tribal members, 1 per household.

Ernest (Steve) Stevens Jr., a senior at Mount Senario College (MSC) has finished his college basketball career with some exciting wins by beating the contending team for first place in the Upper Midwest Collegiate conference. The Saints finished their season with a 11-1 record in the conference and an overall winning record of 17-10.

Steve played his best year with an outstanding performance in the following games:

- * 20 points — 11 rebounds vs. Concordia College of St. Paul.
- * 13 points — 14 rebounds vs. Northland, Minnesota.
- * 19 points — 10 rebounds vs. Viterbo College (contending team).

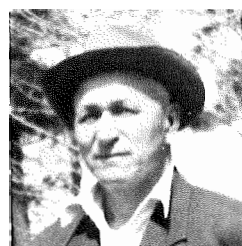
