(DIRECT EMPLOYMENT)

What is it? How does it work? Is it still available? Where do I go to get help if I qualify? These are many of the questions people ask as they attempt to answer the difficult question of: "How do I get started on my new job?"

Actually the relocation program is an old title for a newer program entitled "The Direct Employment Program" or as some of you may know it, the "D.E." program.

In earlier days, the former BIA administered relocation program used to transport eligible individuals to various cities to seek out employment. However this proved not to be always cost effective and at times prone to abuse. Subsequent regulation changes in the way Oneida contracted the program have led to the following eligibility guidelines for Oneida's D.E. program:

1. Adult Indians $\frac{1}{2}$ degree Oneida residing on or near reservation.
2. Must have already secured full-time permanent employment.
3. Applicants must be unemployed.
4. Applicants are eligible up until they received their first full paycheck.

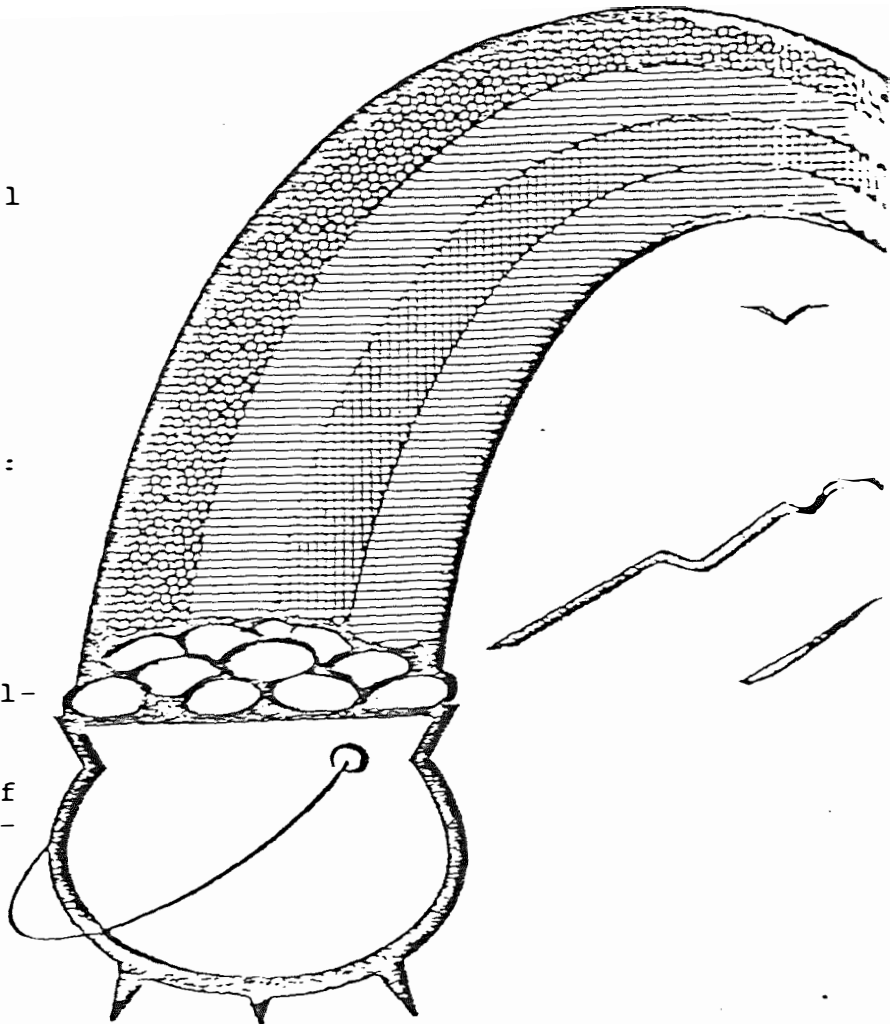
Yes, the program still services on a limited basis and is available by applying in the Oneida Education office. Information to bring along if you believe you qualify would be:

1. Job title,
2. Beginning wage
3. date to start work
4. first paycheck
5. First full payday and
6. A statement that the job is full-time and permanent.

Relocation assistance can be part of the D.E. program when actual relocation is necessary due to a required move for the purpose of secured employment. What you may qualify for depends on many factors so for

Norbert Hill, a Great Chief and Man of Peace

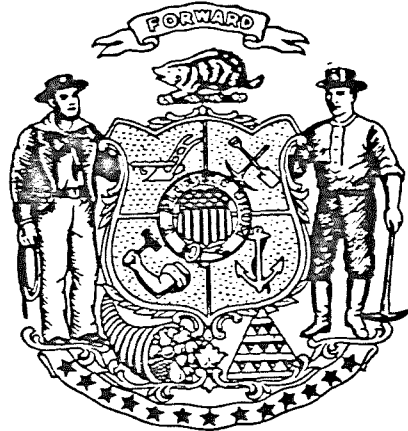

Relating to the life and public service of Norbert Hill Sr.


Whereas, Norbert S. Hill, Sr., Oneida, Wisconsin, dedicated his life to his Tribe, his state and his country; and

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted by the assembly chief clerk to the family of Norbert S. Hill, Sr.





The concession stand will be open.

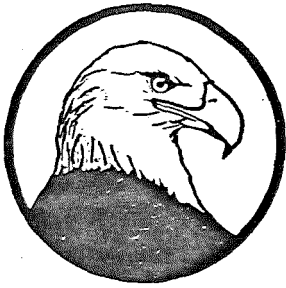
All proceeds will go to the Recreation Program.

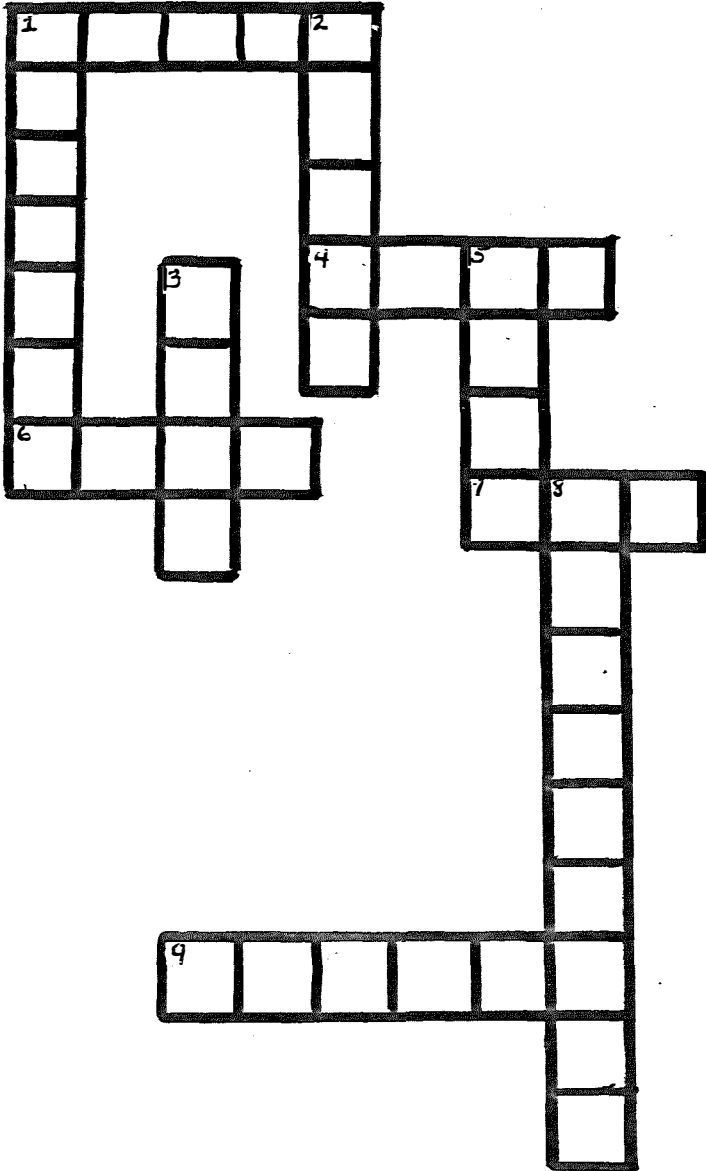

TRIBAL COURT REFERENDUM VOTE
283 Against - 222 For

On July 30, 1983, a referendum was held for the adoption of the Oneida Tribal Court. A resolution by the Oneida General Tribal Council on July 9, 1983, required passage by at least 66% of the voters at the election on July 30. The referendum on adoption of the tribal court rejected the court in substantial numbers. More than 500 votes were cast and less than half supported the tribal court.

The reasons for the rejection of the tribal court are now being analyzed. It is known, however, that certain misstatements were made about the tribal court in the Green Bay Press Gazette and in anonymous leaflets passed out throughout the community. This misinformation was presented in such a way and in such a time so that there could be no rebuttal or response. For example, it was indicated that monetary support for maintenance for the tribal court would come from taxes enacted by the tribe for that purpose. This was an untrue statement that was never made by the Business Committee or any persons associated with the tribe and the tribal government. There were other misstatements suggesting that the Business Committee would control judges. This was not true and every attempt was made to design a system that would eliminate the implied conflicts of interest.

It is important that the tribe be aware of the reasons for the rejection of the tribal court. The "misinformation" referred to above had the intended purpose of discrediting the tribal court. However, it is believed that there are other reasons why the Oneida people rejected the court. It is requested that all tribal members who wish to comment on why the tribal court was rejected contact the Business Committee members, the Kalihwi'saks, or Jerry Hill of the Oneida Law Office so that this may be reported to the people and taken into consideration if and when a tribal court is considered again.

On Saturday, August 6, 1983, the following Oneida runners competed in the Menominee Pow Wow races.

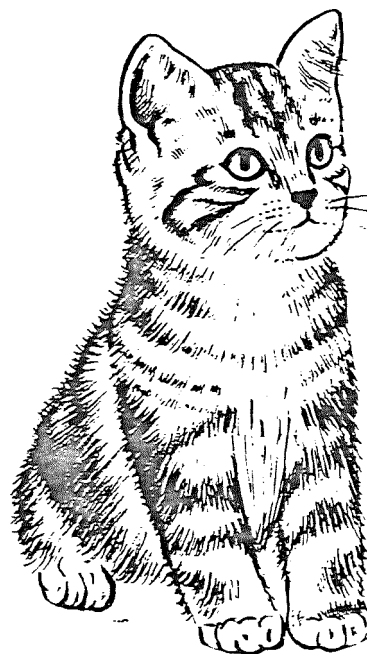

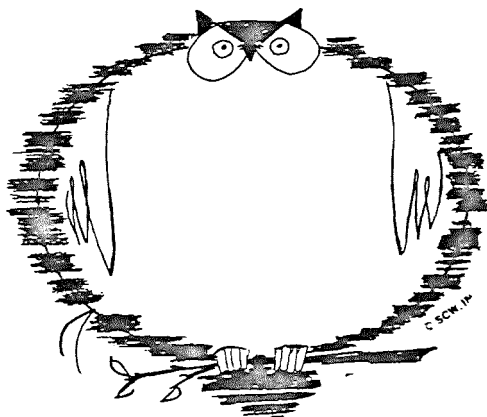

MEMORANDUM-DECISION AND ORDER

The Court has before it (1) a motion by the Oneida Indian Nation of Wisconsin to disqualify Robert T. Coulter as counsel for the Oneida of the Thames Band; and (2) a motion by the Oneida of the Thames Band to compel former counsel Arlinda Locklear to produce material relating to her prior representation of the Band. For the reasons set forth below, the Court concludes that attorney Coulter must be disqualified from representing the Oneida of the Thames Band in this action due to a conflict of interest arising from his simultaneous representation of the Houdenosaunee, and despite the informed consent of both clients. Moreover, the Court believes that, under the circumstances, it is inappropriate to direct attorney Locklear to produce the materials in question, and accordingly denies that motion without prejudice to renew at such time that the Oneida of the Thames Band has secured independent counsel.

This action was jointly commenced by the Oneida Indian Nation of Wisconsin, described in the complaint as an "Indian nation or tribe recognized by the United States with its reservation and principal situs in the State of Wisconsin", and the Oneida of the Thames Band, described in the complaint as an "Indian nation or tribe recognized by Canada with its reserve and principal situs in Southwold, Canada." Plaintiffs allege that they, together with the Oneida Indian Nation of New York, are direct successors in interest to the Oneida Indian Nation, which occupied a large area of land in central New York State "since time immemorial." Plaintiffs seek, inter alia, a declaration of their current right to possess that land, and an award of damages for the period of their dispossession.

From the commencement of this action in 1979 until this past March, attorney Locklear of the Native American Rights Project has represented both the Oneida Indian Nation of Wisconsin and the Oneida of the Thames Band. In March, however, the Oneida of the Thames Band Council terminated her services, and her motion to withdraw as counsel was granted by this Court on July 7. A Notice of Appearance on behalf of the Oneida of the Thames Band had by then already been filed with the Court by attorney Coulter of the Indian Law Resource Center.

Attorney Coulter also presently represents the Houdenosaunee, which is currently seeking to intervene in this action. The Houdenosaunee, also known as the Six Nations or Six Nations

Iroquois Confederacy, is described in its proposed complaint in intervention as "a native nation-state made up of the Mohawk Nation, Oneida Nation, Onondaga Nation, Cayuga Nation, Seneca Nation and Tuscarora Nation (the Cayuga Nation, however, excepts itself from the intervention).

In contrast to the allegations of the Oneida plaintiffs, the Houdenosaunee allege in its proposed complaint in intervention that, since time immemorial, it has owned and occupied the subject land. ¶15, ¶ 38. More specifically, it alleges that:

38. . . .Although each nation [in the Confederacy] has continued to live predominantly within its traditional portion of the Houdenosaunee territory, no formal boundaries exist between the nations. Rather, the land is held as one entire territory of the Houdenosaunee.

39. Even if it were possible or proper to establish boundaries between the nations, the subject land includes land that would belong to the Mohawk Nation to the west, and perhaps to the Cayuga Nation. . . .

The relief sought by the Houdenosaunee includes a declaration that the intervenor is the owner of and has the right to possess the subject land and an award of damages to the intervenor.

The Code of Professional Responsibility has been recognized as an appropriate guideline for the conduct of lawyers in this circuit. Cinema 5, Ltd. v. Cinerama, Inc., 528 F.2d 1384, 1386 (2d Cir. 1976). Canon 5 of the Code provides in pertinent part:

DR 5-105. . . .

(A) A lawyer shall decline proffered employment if the exercise of his independent

professional judgment in behalf of a client will be or is likely to be adversely affected by the acceptance of the proffered employment, or if it would be likely to involve him in representing different interests, except to the extent permitted under DR 5-105(C).

. . . .

(C) In the situations covered by DR 5-105(A) and (B), a lawyer may represent multiple clients if it is obvious that he can adequately represent the interest of each and if each consents after full disclosure of the possible effect of such representation on the exercise of his independent professional judgment on behalf of each.

In this circuit, the principle of Canon 5 has been distilled into a succinct yet strict standard: an attorney who represents multiple clients must be prepared to demonstrate "that there will be no actual or apparent conflict in loyalties or diminution in the vigor of its representation". Glueck v. Jonathan Logan, Inc., 653 F.2d 746, 749, (2d Cir. 1981), citing Cinema 5, supra, 528 F.2d at 1387.

The adverseness in the interests of the Oneida of the Thames and the Houdenosaunee is evident in their pleadings: the Oneida of the Thames claims that the right to possess and receive damages relating to the wrongful possession of the subject lands lies with the successors in interest of the Oneida Indian Nation; the Houdenosaunee claims that those same rights belong to it. The Court cannot but conclude that the vigorous representation of either client would inevitably be at the expense of the interests of the other.

The Oneida of the Thames insist, however, that there is no longer any conflict; that there is now a "unity of interest" or "united front" and that it intends to work "under and through" the Houdenosaunee to achieve their common goal. Moreover, attorney Coulter explains that, to the extent that there may be some "technical variance" between the complaint and the complaint in intervention, it may be resolved by subsequent amendment of one or the other or both pleadings, which would then reflect the true harmony of interest between his clients.

The Court is not privy to the various shifts in policy or strategy among the diverse factions interested in the subject land, and could certainly not state where the true interest of the Oneida of the Thames Band lies. The issue here, however, is not whether the Oneida of the Thames Band may realign with the Houdenosaunee; rather, it is whether an attorney with other loyalties may preside over that realignment. The Court reluctantly concludes that he cannot. To permit attorney Coulter to represent both clients raises too great a risk that he will temper his representation of each as a result of his duty to the other, or to the concept of a "united front".

Both the Oneida of the Thames Band and the Houdenosaunee have been fully informed of the possible conflict, and nevertheless consent to joint representation. The Second Circuit has recognized that in certain circumstances, such as where the matters for which the adverse clients have retained the attorney

are "completely disjoint", the consent to simultaneous representation "will preclude disqualification",

. . . since the clients are in an adequate position to judge the effects of the divided loyalties and may indeed determine this effect to be so minimal as to obviate any fears of inadequate representation.

Westinghouse Electric Corp. v. Gulf Oil Corp., 588 F.2d 221, 229 (2d Cir. 1978). Moreover, the Court has repeatedly stressed the need to be "solicitous of a client's right freely to choose his counsel." Government of India v. Cook Industries, Inc., 569 F.2d 737, 739 (2d Cir. 1978). See also, Hull v. Celanese Corp., 513 F.2d 568, 572 (2d Cir. 1975).

However, the joint representation in the same lawsuit of parties with adverse interests impairs the integrity of the proceeding itself. Under the circumstances, the Court has a duty, notwithstanding the parties' consent, to protect "the integrity of our judicial process", Hull v. Celanese Corp., supra, 513 F.2d at 572, and to "maintain the high standards of the profession," Government of India v. Cook Industries, Inc., supra, 569 F.2d at 739. Thus, under DR 5-105(C), an attorney may represent clients with adverse interests only if there is full consent and only "if it is obvious that he can represent the interest of each."

Although it is evident to the Court that attorney Coulter would strive to represent his clients with integrity and complete good faith, it is nevertheless not obvious that he can adequately

represent the interest of each. The Court therefore grants the motion to disqualify Coulter as attorney for the Oneida of the Thames Band, and directs the Band to retain independent counsel to represent it in this action.


The Oneida of the Thames Band have also moved to compel attorney Locklear to produce certain materials relating to her prior representation of the Band. Locklear has responded inter alia, that the material constitutes historical and legal research that bears on the very issue on which the Oneidas and the Houdenosaunee differ; that she cannot deliver it without violating her duty of loyalty to the Oneida Indian Nation of Wisconsin. She acknowledges that she also has an obligation to her former client, but contends that her obligations to her present client "appear to be of a higher order". Compare DR 2-110(A)(2) (counsel must take "reasonable steps to avoid foreseeable prejudice to the rights of his client, including . . . delivering to the client all papers and property to which the client is entitled. . . .") with EC 5-1 ("The professional judgment of a lawyer should be exercised, within the law, solely for the benefit of his client and free of compromising influences and loyalties. Neither his personal interests, the interests of other clients, nor the desires of third persons should be permitted to dilute his loyalty to his client.")

In light of the disqualification of attorney Coulter, the Court is relieved of any immediate need to weigh these competing

principles. Attorney Locklear has informed the Court that, "[w]ere the Thames Band represented by independent counsel, its former counsel could and would transfer all files to it without endangering the Wisconsin Tribe." The Court therefore denies the motion without prejudice; it may be reasserted, if necessary, at such time as the Oneida of the Thames Band has secured independent counsel.

IT IS SO ORDERED.
