



Oneida School System preps for virtual start to school year

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With the rate of COVID-19 cases in Brown and Outagamie Counties still fluctuating, the Oneida Nation School District has opted to begin the 2020-2021 academic year virtually. The Oneida Nation School Board made this decision following the recommendations of the school administrative team and Oneida Comprehensive Public Health officials. The plan is to begin virtual learning starting September 8 through October 27.

“This was the right decision to make,” Oneida Nation School System Superintendent Sharon Mousseau said. “The original school start date was August 24 and we see these COVID-19 infection numbers jumped again over the weekend (just prior to the original start date.) We’re trying to make schools a safe place not only for the kids but the staff as well.”

Financial assistance has been used to prepare the buildings for the eventual return of kids to the classroom. “We’ve realized we need an isolation station in both buildings (the high school and elementary school) preferably without carpeting. We’ve ordered extra cots also because it’s not a matter of ‘if’ a child has a fever and is ill, but ‘when’ and we need to be ready.”

The sudden shutdown of in-person learning last spring presented challenges for the entire school system, and the school board learned from

the experience. “Last spring was a learning process and we’ve gotten much better with this for the coming fall,” Mousseau said. “Google Meet is where the classrooms will be held for our Families and Children’s Education (FACE) program through Grade 12. FACE is a BIA program for children from birth to five years of age. There will be continuous contact with the parents and plenty of ways to communicate with the staff.”

Houghton Mifflin Harcourt will provide the academic shell for the on-line learning experience of the children. “The curriculum has reading, Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, and all the core academic topics,” Mousseau said. “We’re trying to simplify this as much as possible so there’s only one Google classroom and everybody will know who their homeroom

teacher is. Students with an Individualized Education Program (IEP) will also be able to be linked in with the main classroom as well. Students will also be able to schedule time to meet with the teachers.”

“Under Superintendent Mousseau’s wonderful leadership, we’ve been diligently working to ensure that everything’s in place as far as safety measures and personal protection equipment (PPE) items,” Oneida Nation Elementary School Principal Yvette Peguero said. “So for right now we’ll be virtual, but hopefully when we’re able to have students come back into school the plan is for us to use a hybrid model. That way half our students would come two days per week and the other half the other two days. Our classrooms

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simply aren't large enough to contain a full classroom of students if we're social distancing.

"Over the next few weeks our teachers will be contacting parents to help get them and the kids ready," Peguero said. "There is a schedule that we'll be following so that the families know when the students need to log in. This fall will be far easier and more sensible for students with the improvements we've made since last spring when we were all caught off guard by this thing. It's going to be much more meticulous as far as lesson planning and I think the improvements will be noticeable."

"We miss our students," Peguero said. "As a K-5 principal I can't walk down the halls without students running up and giving me hugs...I really miss that. I know a lot of our students are so loving and ask us how we're doing. We miss our students and wonder if they're doing okay and staying healthy. Unfortunately, we know there are students' families in our community that have been affected by COVID-19 and we worry about them emotionally and physically. We just can't wait to see them again."

Staff from the Oneida Nation High School are also making final preparations for the start to a new, albeit unique, school year. "When we were forced to close early last March we went into what we're referring to as 'emergency remote learning,'" Artley Skenandore, Oneida Nation High School Principal, said. "We had a very short time to plan and prepare and we were going week-to-week. This time around we've spent the summer preparing and getting the necessary supplies and tools that we need to provide good, quality instruction. That's been first and foremost to ensure we're prepared as a staff going into this fall."

Skenandore is grateful to the School Board and the community for sticking to their commitment of 'safety first.' "I applaud the tribe and courage that we've had to maintain our position of safety because that's a very challenging position to take," Skenandore said. "I think our staff and students are really focused and gaining momentum for virtual learning. There will be a higher level of expectation from our students, families, and staff who are working on our virtual orientation.

"This virtual orientation will provide and communicate our expectations of how to approach our class structure at the high school and middle school," Skenandore said. "The foundation for all of this is commitment to communication, communication, communication. It goes back to our core value of encouragement: we have to always look at providing encouragement because we're all on new ground in a virtual platform. In some ways we're all lonely for that face-to-face instruction. Our goal is to get there, but to get there we have to commit to safety right now, and I think we'll be just fine."

The virtual orientation, scheduled for September 3, will take place on the Google Meet platform. "This allows us to jointly meet with parents and students," Skenandore said. "If you can envision a student sitting in their home on Cornelius Circle in front of their Chromebook with their parents, while a teacher does the same in their home, we'll be conducting our virtual meetings in that format. This is something new for us in one sense, but we've already built the practice around it since March. We've gotten better at it and we've had more training, so we're taking what we've learned and sharing it with the parents to improve the outreach and instruction for our students."

Periodic updates will be given during the Oneida Nation's Facebook Live updates that currently take place each Friday at noon. "We're scheduled to be on through October 17 and we'll continue to monitor the COVID-19 numbers and what the best practices should be moving forward to keep everybody safe," Skenandore said. "We'll continue to provide the highest level of instruction which we expect from our staff and the Oneida High School, Middle School, and School System will continue to flourish."

What the community wants to know about COVID-19

COVID-19 has been a major part of our lives since February, and it seems that every day new information pops up about this disease. Some of this new information is true and some is untrue. With the huge amount of information being shared about COVID-19, it is become more difficult to separate factual information from the rumors and myths. With social media, local and national news, websites, magazines, and political announcements all focused on COVID-19, it isn't surprising that we are getting overwhelmed and confused about COVID-19 information.

Because this disease is so new, the professional guidance and recommendations are constantly being updated to reflect the new information discovered about this disease and how the disease is spread.

Oneida Public Health Department has put together a list of commonly asked questions regarding COVID-19 and answered these questions about COVID-19 to help provide some clarification for the community.

COVID-19 Frequently Asked Questions:

Q: What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

A: COVID-19 symptoms can include cough, shortness of breath, fever, sore throat, diarrhea, vomiting, chills, headache, fatigue, body aches, loss of smell, and loss of taste.

Q: Is it possible to be infected with COVID-19 and not have symptoms?

A: Yes. It is possible to have COVID-19 with and without symptoms. Cough, sore through, fever, shortness of breath, headache, chills, diarrhea, vomiting, fatigue, body aches, loss of smell, and loss of taste are the most common symptoms of COVID-19. Symptoms typically ap-

pear from 2-14 days after exposure, but some people who are infected never experience any symptoms at all. It is important to remember that just because an infected person doesn't have any symptoms, that person can still spread the disease to others.

Q: How is COVID-19 spread?

A: COVID-19 is spread most often through the respiratory droplets that someone with COVID-19 produces when they sneeze, cough, and talk. Wearing a mask properly greatly decreases the risk of spreading the Corona Virus.

Q: Is the COVID-19 virus spread by ticks or mosquitoes?

A: At this time, there is no data to suggest that COVID-19 is being transmitted by mosquitos or ticks. COVID-19 spreads from person to person.

Q: When should I get tested for COVID-19?

A: If you have symptoms of COVID-19 or had close contact with someone with a COVID-19 infection you should be tested. If unsure about testing, call your healthcare provider and they will recommend what next steps to take.

Q: Can someone test negative and later test positive for COVID-19?

A: Yes, this is possible. If a person gets tested too soon after being exposed, your test may come back negative.

A: You could also be exposed to COVID-19 after your test and get infected then. Just because your test came negative once, does not mean you are not at risk of being infected later on. It is important to still take steps to protect yourself and others.

Q: I am nervous about being exposed to COVID-19 in my workplace; what is the best way to protect myself?

A: As of 7/27/2020, business in Green

Bay and Oneida have implemented a mandatory masking policy. Employees and customers are now required to wear masks while in these establishments. This policy is a great way to prevent exposure to COVID-19. Masking, social distancing, hand washing, and cough etiquette are effective methods to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Even if a person has brief contact with someone who is infected with COVID-19, if a person follows the methods above, they would be considered a low risk for catching COVID-19.

Q: Where are people at most risk for being exposed and infected with COVID-19?

A: Through contact tracing and interviews of Oneida Community members with positive COVID cases, the Public Health Team has noticed that most people who have become infected with COVID have:

- Attended group gatherings
- Not worn masks in public
- Not practiced social distancing
- Did not follow isolation/quarantine recommendations

Q: What if I'm pregnant and have COVID-19?

A: If you test positive for COVID-19 while pregnant Public Health will provide you with isolation instructions, based on whether or not you have COVID-19 symptoms and how close you are to your due date. You may be tested 3-5 days before admission or when admitted to the hospital for delivery, and possibly be retested at discharge from the hospital after the baby has been born.

Q: What is the difference between being isolated and being quarantined?

A: People who are in isolation are infected with COVID. Isolation is

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meant to keep sick people separated from others to reduce the risk of others becoming infected. The isolation period is different for everyone because all COVID cases are different.

A: Quarantine is for people who are known to have been exposed to a person with COVID-19 and are not showing symptoms themselves. Quarantine separates these people from others, as a safety measure to prevent the spread of infection, in case, the person becomes ill.

Q: Can COVID-19 be spread through food, including restaurant take out, refrigerated or frozen packaged food?

A: Currently, there is no evidence to support transmission of COVID-19 through food. That being said, it is always a good idea to practice general food safety and wash your hands before and after eating/preparing food.

Q: Face Coverings vs. Masks- is there a difference?

A: Face coverings and masks serve the same purpose, to act as a barrier from respiratory droplets. When worn properly, face coverings and masks should cover both the nose and mouth without any large gaps near the cheeks, chin, and top of the nose.

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Oneida One Stops transition program to Rewards +



The Oneida One Stops have transitioned their rewards program to Mobil Rewards+. The new program will allow customers the ability to earn points on nearly all their purchases. 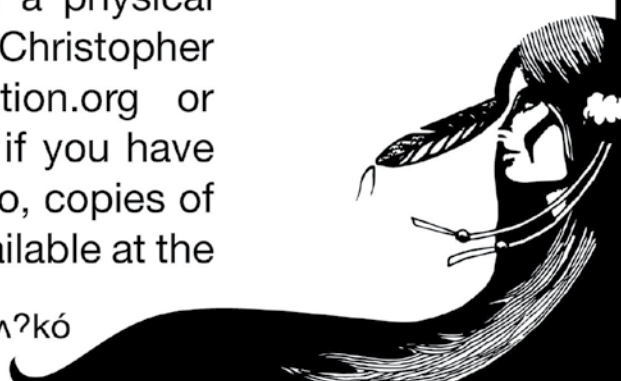
