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DAY CARE A REALITY!

The Oneida Day Care Center will open its doors on September 30th. It will be located at the Seminary.

The Oneida Day Care Center shall be established as a group day care service for children who need day-time care away from their own homes. Young children may require daytime care for one or more reasons; young mothers who want to take advantage of employment or educational opportunities. The Day Care Center will provide a clean, safe, healthy and happy environment; one that is conducive to the overall growth and development of each child.

The Day Care Center will accept children between the ages of one and one-half years to five years. There will be a maximum enrollment of 25 children.

The Center will operate September thru May, Monday thru Friday, 6:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

The Center will operate on a sliding fee scale. Fees will be related to parents income level. The minimum weekly rate will be six dollars and the maximum rate weekly will be twenty-five dollars per child.

Applications will be made to the Director of the Center at the Seminary. Registration will begin on September 16th through the 20th at the Seminary from 9:00 A.M. - 12:00 A.M.

The Director of the Oneida Day Care Center is Miss Laura Claven of Appleton, Wisconsin. The two assistants will be Mrs. Loretta Skenandore and Mrs. Dolores Skenandore.
