



## Biden nixes controversial Keystone XL pipeline

Thanksgiving Day 2016: Water protectors from more than 300 Nations and environmentalists stood with the Standing Rock Sioux throughout the year as Canadian-based TC Energy and Keystone XL attempted to complete construction of an oil line that passes directly through the Missouri River. The Army Corps of Engineers rejected an original pipeline proposal because of its proximity to Bismarck's primary water source but did not share the same concern for the Standing Rock Sioux.

President Joe Biden got right to work during his first week in the Oval Office by signing numerous executive actions and orders. These included masking and social distancing mandates, extending eviction and foreclosure moratoriums until March 31, and the reversal of a travel ban from several Muslim majority countries including Iran, Syria, Sudan, Somalia, and Yemen. But it was his sweeping executive orders revoking a key permit for the Keystone XL pipeline and halting oil and gas leasing in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge that got the attention of Indian Country and environ-

mentalists alike.

Biden's action halts a permit issued to Canadian-based TC Energy to carry 830,000 barrels of heavy crude daily from the oil fields in Alberta along a 1,200-mile pipeline across the border to Nebraska. Hundreds of Native tribes, particularly the Standing Rock Sioux of North Dakota, denounced the pipeline saying it would negatively impact reservation lands and expose the environment, particularly their water, to contamination. "Leaving the Keystone XL pipeline permit in place would not be consistent with my Administration's economic and climate imperatives," Biden said as he signed the new order.

Prior to the construction of the current line, the Army Corps of Engineers rejected an initial route across the Missouri River because

of its proximity to municipal water sources for the city of Bismarck. The line also would have been 11 miles longer. They did not voice the same concerns for the Standing Rock Sioux when they then decided the line would cross underneath the Missouri, also that Nation's primary water source, a mere half-mile from their Reservation.

The Dakota Access Pipeline (DAPL) protests began in earnest in early 2016 as members of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, with the support of members from more than 300 other Native Nations and environmentalists, gathered to stop the construction of the pipeline. One water protector was killed, more than 300 injured, and approximately 500 were

# A message from Treasurer Tina Danforth

A new year and new beginnings are unfolding with unprecedented events occurring nationally as the country transitions into new Leadership with President Biden and Vice President Harris. The newly seated administration promises to unfold new opportunities for Tribal Nations and their communities. Our voice and our participation in the electoral process by many leaders, organizations and Tribal citizens will have a seat and a voice that will not go unheard. President Biden (what a refreshing thing to say) will tackle the economy, a response to the pandemic and work to direct much needed relief through a stimulus. Biden is committed to a national vaccine program which will help to reopen our schools, a \$1,400 stimulus payment, housing assistance, childcare assistance, health-care access and a federal minimum wage increase. While these are all important initiatives it will demand patience as we recover from the economic and political turmoil our country has been facing. As these events unfold, we as a Nation will do our part to assist our Oneida citizens with the best information and how they impact our constituents.

It is with gratitude and sincere dedication to the office of the Oneida Nation Treasurer that I will present information on the current FY 2021 Budget and its' deliverables. My office consists of the Larry Barton, Chief Financial Officer; Ralinda Ninham Lamberies, Assistant Chief Financial Officer and Rae Skenandore, Budget Analyst who have been diligent in coordinating the efforts and objectives to best serve the Oneida Nation. In late October a balanced budget was presented to the Oneida Business Committee which included input from the organization, a conservative financial projection of

resources and the mandates of General Tribal Council (GTC) on a limited basis. On 11/24/21 the Oneida Business Committee approved the FY 2021 Budget and amended the Budget Management Control Act on an emergency basis which eliminated the ability to have a GTC Budget meeting. It states, "in the event that the Nation proclaims an emergency, in accordance with the Emergency Management and Homeland Security law, which prevents presentation and adoption of the budget by the General Tribal Council, the Oneida Business Committee shall adopt the Nation's budget".

The highlights of the FY 2021 Budget includes, a fully funded scholarship, elder per capita payments (age 62 and over), a \$500 General Welfare payment to all members, an employment cap of 2,200 employees excluding newly grant funded positions, a .30 hourly wage increase, a zero cost insurance premium for all employees, a two week Covid 19 paid time off initiative, paid time off Liability funding, a Permanent Executive Contingency fund and a two week Gaming Deposit contingency.

All of these financial initiatives are to ensure the protection and viability of the Nation's general health, welfare and economy. To further elaborate and discuss these items a Virtual meeting is being scheduled with several Community meetings on the FY 2021 Budget. Pre-registration is required for all Community meetings and space is limited and we will adhere to all Tribal guidelines set forth through the extension of the declaration of the Public Health State of Emergency.

The Virtual Budget Meeting will be online 2/4/21 at 2:00 pm and four Oneida Community Meetings will be held at the Radisson on 2/18/21.

There will also be two Community meetings in Milwaukee at the SEOTS office on 2/22/21 at 11:00 am and 1:30 pm.

To register please call the following; Oneida 920 869-4481 and SEOTS 414 329-4101. Remember seating is limited and only enrolled Oneida Nation citizens may attend. A Budget packet is on its way so please be sure to watch your mail.

I am looking forward to hearing from you all at the upcoming budget meetings. I am very grateful for the Oneida employees both management and frontline workers who have committed to our Nation during these difficult times. All areas have made some sacrifices due to our financial constraints. I am also thankful for all Oneida people for your cooperation, understanding and patience as we do the best we can for our collective community. I sincerely appreciate the opportunity to serve all of you.

# Finance Committee news on the FY21 Community Fund

The Finance Committee is taking Community Fund applications for the FY21 year. The purpose of the Community Fund is to serve the Oneida community members by offering funds and/or Coca-Cola products. The Community Fund is available to all enrolled Oneida member and is designated specifically for:

1. Self-Development (for youth and adults),
2. Oneida Community Events and
3. Fundraisers that benefit Oneida members or the Community

Due to the current pandemic, requests for virtual and safe activities are encouraged. All funding requests do oblige the requester to provide a 10% match. Individual requests are limited to a maximum of \$500 once per year per person and

group requests to \$750 once per year per group.

For FY21 the FC has relaxed the requirements in their decision to allow for certain requests that are exercise related such as exercise equipment in the hope that Oneida members can continue their physical fitness activities safely at home. There are additional requirements for such requests, and interested members are encouraged to contact the Finance Committee or the Oneida Website for additional details.

Any travel or travel related request; requests that can be obtained from another tribal program; or any other type of personal request are excluded. Tribal programs are also excluded from funding requests, but may be eligible for product requests,

provided the event is open, free, safe and benefit the community/public.

The Finance Committee reviews all requests once each month. There is one application for funding requests and one application for Coca-Cola product requests. The FY21 packets/forms are available on the Oneida Tribal Website page under the Finance Committee.

All requesters are asked to submit requests at least six weeks before actual need or event date. # Yukwatsistay<sup>^</sup> says Yaw<sup>^</sup>ko to the Nation

On behalf of the Board members/volunteers, we wish to say a huge Yaw<sup>^</sup>ko (Thank You) to all the participants and community members in and around the Oneida Nation, and those who entrusted us enough to help them with addiction over these past 3 and half years. To those that networked with us for joint efforts to help sustain a culturally healthier and stronger reconnected community. We appreciated all those who supported us through additional volunteer efforts, and to those who attended our circles/fires, potlucks, recovery meetings, trainings, events, and fun activities/fundraisers. There was an immediate need requested to help those wanting to get help, and at the same time to participate in bringing about awareness regarding the serious epidemic of opioids and community members affected by addictions. Together we learned what this epidemic does to the addict, and how it affects our community/families, and the future generations. We all continued to learn from each other.

I hope at some point you had the opportunity to just stop in or walk through our doors. To attend our programs or events so that you fully understand that our volunteers went above and beyond to help bring about change or understanding. We were fortunate to have community members step up and provide other activities, such as beading, sewing, artistic activities, and cultural practices to our participants of whatever it was

they told us they needed. Through our networking, we were able to provide many resources.

As you know COVID 19, put a halt to many things for everyone, including our office. We continued to hold recovery fires, and one meeting a week when it was safe and with the proper guidelines to keep people safe. To ensure a sober place would continue, we began to have conversations between Behavioral Health and the Tribal Action Plan management. We had been a main staple in the Tribal Action Plan objectives, and we were honored to do this for the community. We are all concerned that such a place remains opens to community, that can provide a sober and safe environment.

Yukwatsistay<sup>^</sup> Future Plans – There is more work to be done.

We will still be Yukwatsistay<sup>^</sup> but without an office. We are in recovery, and those of us who took training for Recovery Coach training will still be available to help if contacted. We are hoping that the office will be picked up by one of the two, Behavioral Health, or TAP, or combination of both, so that we can still volunteer our time.

In the future when it is safe, Yukwatsistay<sup>^</sup> will come together to host fundraisers, the money we raise will go to whomever the group decides may need it. For instance, whatever program we see in the community working with those for addiction.

Please let me take the time now to say a heartfelt thank you to the major

players who volunteered their time over these past 3 plus years for you; Kermit Valentino, who unfortunately passed on in October of 2020, but was a major part of who we were in all aspects, Cassandra Sherrod, who took care of fundraisers/admin duties, Frank Vandehei, Firekeeper, Recovery Coach and all around helper, Gina Vandehei, volunteered so many hours while providing good insight, Francine Valentino, Recovery Coach, and her dedication to the Women's meetings, James Sherrod, Recovery Coach, and all around helper, Dana Isaac, Firekeeper, Artist, and all around helper, Dr. Anita Barber, good facilitator/mentor, sewing teacher, and all around helper, Mak-enit Cornelius, internship worker, marketing, and all around volunteer, Neshoba Maupin, Youth Ambassador for Yukwatsistay<sup>^</sup> and helper, Gabryella Valentino, Youth Ambassador for Yukwatsistay<sup>^</sup> and helper. arrested as private security firms unleashed pepper spray and attack dogs on the demonstrators. Police in riot gear also used water cannons in freezing weather during the standoff and subjected arrested demonstrators to strip searches and freezing conditions in the Morton County, North Dakota, jail as protests continued throughout the year.

Despite legal proceedings the pipeline was eventually permitted to flow with assurances from TC Energy that the line was environmentally safe. Several accidents, including a 200,000-gallon oil spill in November 2017, have occurred since that time.

Biden’s actions were both praised by various First Nations and environmentalists and condemned by members of the Canadian government, along with union groups that supported him during his presidential run. “As an American Indian Tribe that has experienced environmental injustice and one that opposed the KXL, we are hopeful that (Biden’s) action on KXL is just the beginning,” a press release from the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe read. “President Biden campaigned on changing environmental justices and climate policies and we are glad to see him following through on major areas of concern on his first day in office.”

“This is a gut punch for the Canadian and Alberta economies,” Alberta Premier Jason Kenney said. “Sadly, it is an insult directed at the United States’ most important ally and trading partner. If this energy doesn’t move by pipe it will move by rail, and even President Obama’s State Department concluded that would actually increase carbon emissions.”

“When built with union labor by the men and women of the United Association of Union Plumbers and Pipefitters (UA), pipelines like

Keystone XL remain the safest and most efficient modes of energy transportation in the world,” UA President Mark McManus, whose union fully endorsed Biden, said. “Sadly, the Biden Administration has now put thousands of union workers out of work. For the average American family, it means energy costs will go up and communities will no longer see the local investments that come with the pipeline construction.”

While Biden’s first days in office may signal an optimistic outlook for a cleaner environmental future, there will almost certainly be governmental blowback, and even legal action, taken by the Canadian government and pipeline investors against the United States. “Canadian businesses and Alberta’s government invested money into this project, particularly the border crossing, which is the subject of the presidential permit and now veto,” Kenney said. “Our point is investments were made based on the predictability of the American regulatory and approval systems that were in place. Those have now been retroactively repealed by President Biden. We think that’s a violation of investor protection provisions of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA.)”

Despite the controversy that continues to surround the DAPL, Biden appears ready to combat many of the 78 deregulatory actions President Trump took in his four years in office against the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Those actions included dismantling the climate change program, air and water pollution regulations, and toxic chemical regulations.
