



Oneida Nation's VFW Post 7784 celebrates 75 years of community support

The Oneida Nation Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 7784 is celebrating 75 years in the community. Chartered November 12, 1946, the chapter is named after United States Army Sergeant Robert W. Cornelius who made the ultimate sacrifice for his nations June 23, 1944, in France. Members of the post initially held meetings in a log cabin on Hwy 54 before moving into a small, white building on land donated by Oneida warrior Pierce Baird. The current VFW building, raised in 2009, still sits on the same land donated by Baird at 2980 E. Service Road in Oneida.

Army Sergeant and WWII Veteran Roy Huff took the reigns as the original VFW Post 7784 Commander, with at least a dozen others stepping into Huff's leadership role across the years leading up to the present day. Current Post Commander Cletus Ninham Sr., a Vietnam-era Army Airborne hero, has been at the helm since 2006.

Under Ninham's leadership, Post 7784 has continued to live up to their role as community and veteran servants. Veterans Homes in King and Iron Mountain, among others, have been recipients of Post 7784's personal and financial generosity. "We do our best to serve

our Nation's youth by sponsoring activities like baseball, basketball, Breakfast With Santa, and things of that nature," Ninham said. "We can't help everybody, but we always try to help veterans that are in need. And we have to do our due diligence when it comes to things of that nature because we've been taken advantage of a few times."

Honoring Oneida's war heroes is also part of the VFW's mission. "Our Memorial Day activities include going to nine cemeteries and locations and honoring all of the veterans there," Ninham said. "We participate in Oneida's 4th of July parade, and we are proud to assist anybody requesting the services of

our Color Guard."

Career Air Force Veteran and current Oneida Nation Veterans Services Manager Kerry Metoxen is closing in on 30 years with Post 7784. "I was our Quartermaster for about eight years," Metoxen said. "One of the bigger accomplishments we've achieved in my time here is the VFW building that went up in 2009. We're big on Memorial Day and Veterans Day events like cooking up booyah.

But I think the community really sees what we do when we perform military rites for our veterans which is always an emotional time.

“We very much love doing things for our community. We help with events at the Civic Center like Booh Bash and the Easter Egg Hunt, we’ve donated bikes to the Oneida Volunteer Fire Department for their fundraiser, and the Oneida Giving Tree each Christmas. What really shows our community pride is the fact that every military branch flag, the Oneida Nation flag, and the POW flag raised outside our VFW building was donated to us by community veterans and their families.

“We really could use some younger veterans in our post, so we welcome you to come join us if you qualify. When I first joined we had a lot of brother-brother and father-son members, but those days are gone. Everyone gets old.”

The Oneida Nation VFW Post 7784 hosts their monthly meetings the first Tuesday of every month at 6:00 p.m. The post is always looking for younger combat veterans to join and help carry on their legacy of community and veterans support. Those interested will have their first year of membership paid for by the VFW. Contact Cdr. Ninham at (920) 217-0135. “We’re hoping young veterans will step up to the plate, come on down, and join us,” Ninham said. “We are open to all veterans; you don’t have to be an Oneida citizen to join us. We’d be honored with your presence.”



Liberty Tree Dedication for Oneida Patriot Capt. James (Powlis) Powless

(Oneida, Wisconsin) - Jean Nicolet Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and Captain Hendrick Aupaumut Chapter Sons of the American Revolution commemorated the Revolutionary War service of Oneida Captain James (Powlis) Powless with a Liberty Tree Dedication and marker October 9 at the Oneida Veterans Memorial Wall in Oneida.

The original Liberty Tree (1646-1775) was significant in American history. It was a famous elm tree that stood in Boston near Boston Common in the years before the American Revolution. In 1765, colonists in Boston staged the first act of defiance against the British government at the tree.

James (Powlis) Powless, Oneida Chief Waka-dale-yon-due-law, whose Oneida name means “it became worrisome,” served during the Revolutionary War with Colonel Louis (A-tayala-rongh-ta) and

his New York Line. Captain James Powless was one of twelve Chiefs or Indians of the Oneidas or Tuscarora, one of four captains who were commissioned as Officers of the Line of the Army. Captain Powless died on March 15, 1849. It is believed he is buried in the Chief Henry Powless family plot of the Oneida Holy Apostles Cemetery.

DAR Regent Shirley VerBruggen said, “Jean Nicolet Chapter, DAR is honored to partner with Captain Hendrick Aupaumut Chapter, SAR and the Oneida Tribe of Indians to pay tribute to Revolutionary War Patriot Oneida Captain James Powless with a Liberty Tree – a living memorial to Captain Powless and the generations of Oneida Indians who have preserved and protected our liberties in their military service for America. Captain Powless, who lived to be 99 years, is the only Revolutionary War Soldier buried in this area that the Jean Nicolet had identified.”

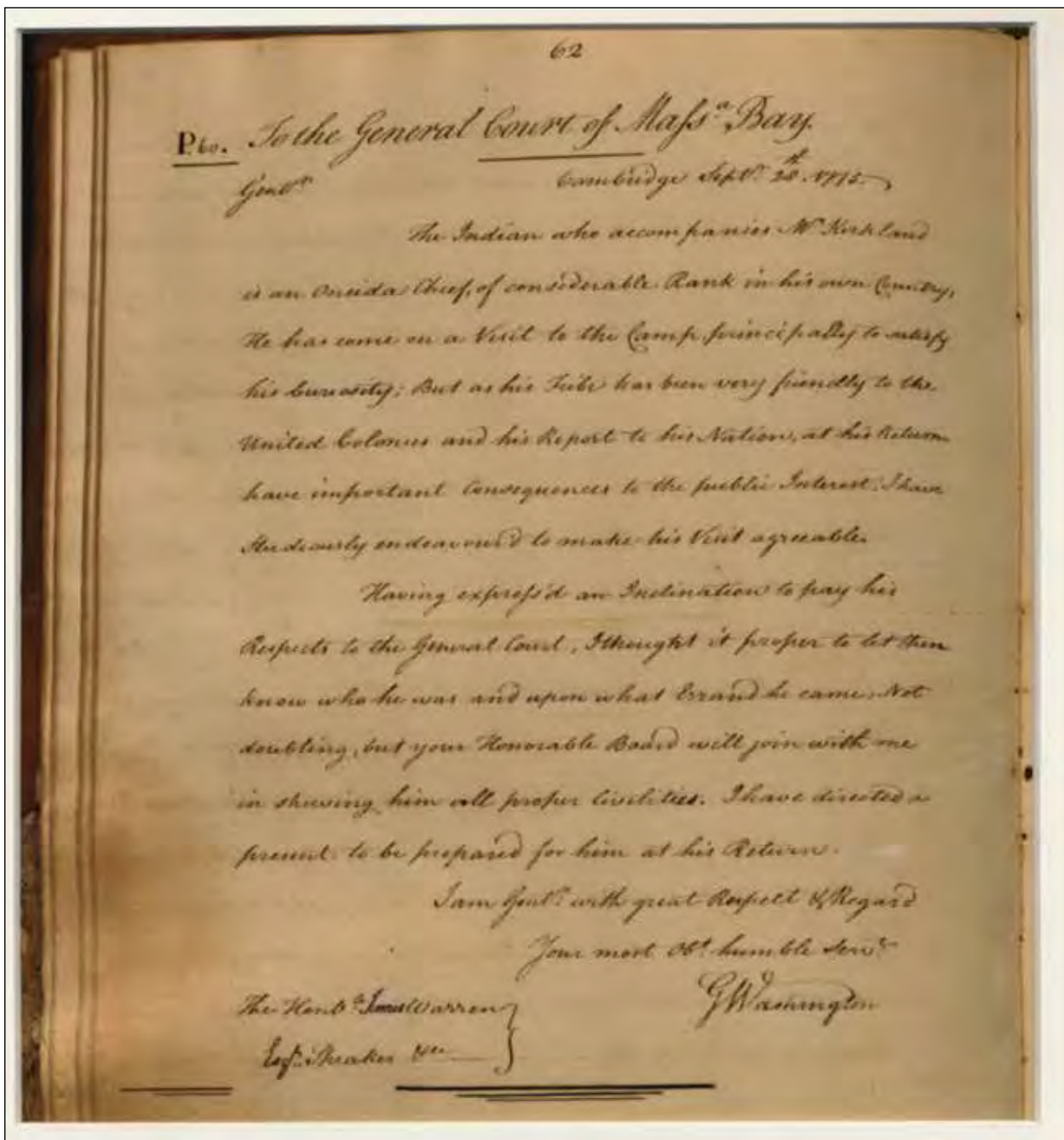

Terence "Terry" Danforth, of Parma, Ohio, passed away on October 16, 2021.

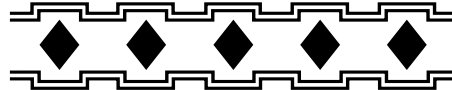

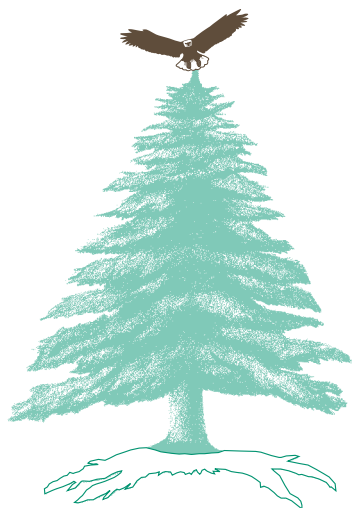
Packers' fans have mixed emotions as of now by them getting blown out in their first game and winning the second by 18 points and now holding a record of 5-1.

Student One: You know winter, to me, feels really sad, lonely and depressing. Everything seems so dark.

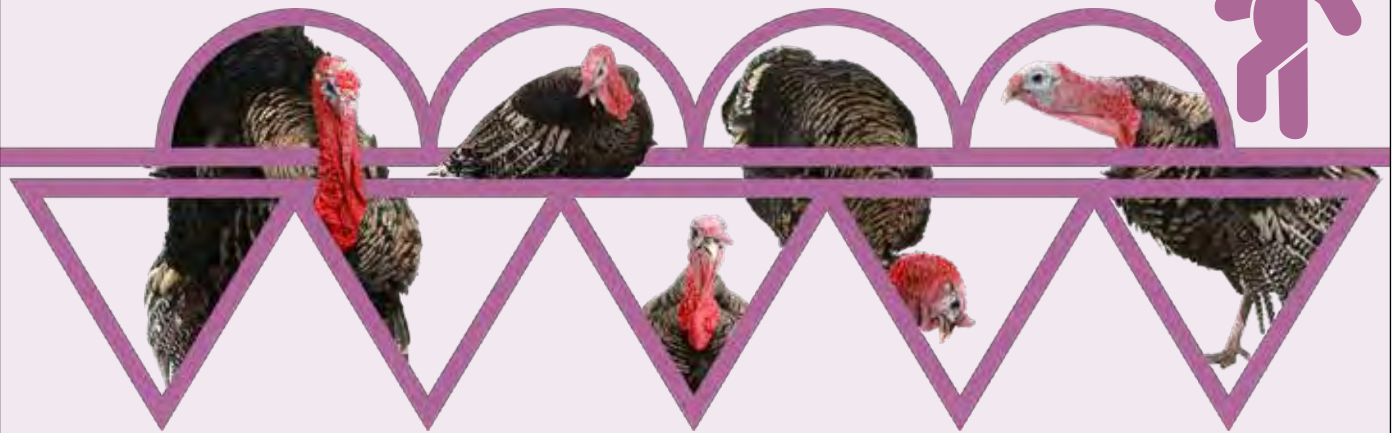
Student Two: Winter, to me, is so beautiful and calming. Everything seems like we are in heaven.

The Oneida Land Commission, through EHSLA Division, Land Management area, is requesting tribal members' assistance in naming of two different buildings, Oneida Social Services and Comprehensive Housing Division Warehouse. Name selection will be based upon the following criteria:

- 1) the original allottee
- 2) an Oneida historical event
- 3) a tribal member that has made an exemplary contribution to the Oneida Nation
- 4) a description of the area

Most of the Oneida Reservation had been allotted, parceled out and dedicated to tribal members who were enrolled at that time. The properties were initially placed in trust for the first 25 years.

Property History – Oneida Social Services Building, West Point Road

The original allotments were NE1/4, SW ¼, Lot 20 and 25 to Simeon Hill, Lot 26 to William Hill, Lot 27 to Sophia Cornelius, and Lot 28 to Delia Duxtater, all in Section 29, Township 24 N, Range 20 East, 4th Principal Meridian. The Oneida Nation purchased the property from the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity organization in December of 1996.

Property History – Oneida Comprehensive Housing Warehouse, Seminary Road

The original allotment was to Thomas Summers, Indian Claim 110, Section 9, Township 23N, Range 19E, 4th Principal Meridian. The Oneida Nation purchased the property from Beulah Van Schyndel, June 27, 1983 satisfying a Land Contract that was entered into 8/31/1978.

Hunting season is here, and many Oneida Sportsmen are looking forward to being able to provide their families and other community members with a nutritional food source. To ensure our deer population remains healthy, it is important we monitor for diseases and conditions that occur in Wisconsin. These include Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), Bovine Tuberculosis (TB), and Epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD). While these deer diseases are currently not considered a public health threat to humans, it is vital that we all do our part to monitor our area for suspected sick animals, as such conditions can be fatal and spread quickly throughout a deer population.

SO, WHAT CAN I DO?

- **REPORT OBSERVATIONS OF SICK OR INJURED DEER.**

If you notice any sick-looking deer (i.e., unusual behavior and/or, emaciation), call and report it to the Conservation Department. Dead deer on the side of the roadways do not need to be reported.

- **LIMIT BAITING ACTIVITIES!**

Refrain from using animal attractants such as grain, apples, or other feed to concentrate animals to improve your success of harvesting, or simply for observing deer. Actions of baiting increases the frequency that animals come into close contact with each other. This close contact increases the spread of any infectious disease that may be present in a population.

- **PRACTICE PROPER HANDLING**

While field dressing, wear rubber gloves, and ensure any open wounds or sores on your hands are covered. If your hands, arms and open wounds cannot be covered, do not field dress the animal. Limit contact with the brain and spinal cord and designate only non-household knives for field dressing. Bring water, soap, paper towels, and hand sanitizer with you to wash and sanitize your hands. Place the animal on a plastic drop cloth, instead of directly on the ground, to limit contamination of grounds with deer innards which could be a source of infection. Use a bleach solution to sanitize processing knives afterwards. If commercial processing is used, ask for individual processing. Bag up any remains; do not leave gut piles in the woods as these can also be sources of infection!



CONSERVATION DUMPSTER IS NOW AVAILABLE AND ACCESSIBLE

To help prevent the spread of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), double bag gut piles and utilize the CWD dumpster at the Conservation Field Office, located at N8047 County Rd U, Oneida, WI 54155, for disposal of carcasses and other remains. This dumpster is free for community members and can be accessed at any time. The site is under video monitoring to ensure proper use. Please contact our Conservation Department at 920-869-6500 with any questions, concerns, or to report any sick or injured deer.

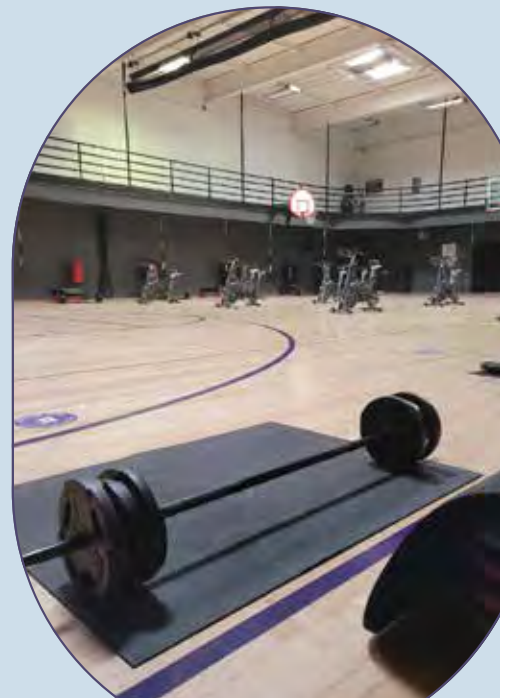

COVID-19 Vaccine Updates - Booster Doses

To determine your eligibility - first determine which COVID-19 vaccine you received for your initial dose(s).

If you received the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine:

You may receive a single booster dose of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after your last dose if you are:

- 65 years or older
- 18 - 64 years old, with a high risk of severe COVID-19
- 18 - 64 years with increased risk of exposure to COVID-19 due to your workplace or residential setting

If you received the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine:

You may receive a single booster dose of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine at least 2 months after your last dose if you are:

- 18 years or older

If you received the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine:

You may receive a single booster dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after your last dose if you are:

- 65 years or older
- 18 - 64 years old, with a high risk of severe COVID-19
- 18 - 64 years with increased risk of exposure to COVID-19 due to your workplace or residential setting

Can I "Mix and Match" my booster dose?

The U.S Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved use of "mix and match" booster doses.

This means you may now receive a COVID-19 booster dose that is different than the COVID-19 vaccine that you received for your initial dose(s).

If you decide to "mix and match" your booster dose, you will need to follow the eligibility and vaccine administration timeline of whichever initial dose you received.

For Example:

If you received the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine for your initial dose, you could receive the Moderna or Pfizer Booster dose 2 months after receiving your Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

OR

If you received the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine for your initial dose, (as long as you fall into one of the eligible groups) you could receive the Johnson & Johnson or Pfizer Booster dose 6 months after receiving your Moderna vaccine.

OR

If you received the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine for your initial dose, (as long as you fall into one of the eligible groups) you could receive the Johnson & Johnson or Moderna Booster dose 6 months after receiving your Pfizer vaccine.
